

USPS January 2025 Rate Changes By Peter Elias

Up for approval by the PRC (Postal Rate Commission) are the following rate increases submitted on November 14, 2024 that are to take effect on January 19, 2025:

Priority Mail +3.2%, Priority Mail Express +3.2%, Ground Advantage +3.9% and Parcel Select +9.2%.

Commonly used rates to be in effect (if approved) are shown in the right column in the table. Rates with changes have an arrow to the left and are in an *italic dark red* font. Unchanged rates are in green.

While some rates do appear to have gone down, it is only because they were just temporarily increased on October 6, 2024 to begin with (...for the holidays...); technically they are still higher than the last permanent rate changes that took effect on July 14, 2024.

Slimy Gum

Yeah, that title doesn't sound too enticing, right? Soaking stamps: it is an activity that is a part of stamp collecting. Well, unless you just don't want to do that.

Most of the time, we're soaking off used stamps that have been mailed on envelopes or postcards.

Then there are other reasons to soak stamps. They could be used stamps that have heavy or seemingly unpeelable hinge remnants, or mint stamps that were poorly stored (humid environment) that got stuck to each other or on album pages.

Older US stamps generally soak off fairly easily, to the point of almost floating off the envelope paper and the gum is dissolved in your soaking bowl.

But then there are some stamps that do come off the paper (or separate from other stamps) easily, BUT the gum does not dissolve, and stays on the backside of the stamp. And that gum is well, "slimy". It has an incredibly "slick" feel to it when you lightly rub a finger across it, and it will NOT come off. That in turn creates a problem when you now try to "dry" the stamp (I use stamp drying books). In the end, the stamp would simply be stuck against the drying book pages!



Slimy gum on a wet stamp has a "glossy" look on the stamp paper as shown above.

While I don't have a definitive list of which stamps are like this, I'm sure you've probably also run across a few while soaking various foreign stamps.

I think that some of the worst offenders are stamps from the British Empire / Commonwealth, especially those from the early 1900's to perhaps 1950's, when the stamps were still printed via "engraving". Shown above is one such stamp, it is a 4p stamp from Jamaica, Scott #122, issued in 1938. I really like these stamps with their "crisp" designs. Unfortunately the gum is horrible. Stamps from many French colonies & territories of that same era also have the same problem. So, how does one get around the problem of "slimy" gum that just won't come off the stamp papers?



Here is my solution that works reasonably well for me. Look at the picture above. I generally soak stamps in the sink in my spare bathroom. After I make sure that the sink top has just a few drops of water on it, I fish out the offending stamp and lay it upside down as shown above while it is still soaking wet and the gum is still slimy.

Then I use an old toothbrush (with soft bristles) and while holding the stamp down on one end with my thumb, I carefully "brush" the wet gum off the wet stamp away from my thumb, I then repeat this for the other half side of the stamp. Sometimes I have to dip the brush in the water to make sure that the stamp remains wet.

This "brushing" will take off most of the gum and doesn't affect the stamp paper. Since the sink top is still a bit wet, I then slide the stamp off and put it back in the sink. There, while mostly submerged, I hold the (printed side down) against my index & middle finger and my thumb on top, and then slowly rub off any remaining "sliminess" (which you can feel, as there will be a bit more



friction when the gum is gone).

Above is a picture that shows me doing the last bit that I mentioned. Then I simply put the stamp into the drying book, cover it with a reasonably heavy object and wait a couple of days. At that point, the stamp should now easily come off the drying page (as without doing all of the above, it would be firmly stuck to the drying pages, especially if you are drying your stamps in something other than a drying book).

Hopefully, if you are soaking stamps and run into the "slimy gum" syndrome, try some of the above!

- Bourse Tom Cunningham announced there were 25 dealers. We had to find a replacement near the end due to a pull out. He expressed a concern because we have 9 dealers over 80.
- Chance Board Patty Poore says next year we will stabilize the prices. There was a lot of traffic and she ran out of prizes. She will work with Skip to plan for next year's supply.
- Mini-Exhibits Peter Elias says he needs more people to offer exhibits so we don't just repeat the ones he is using.
- Financial Tom Cunningham presented a very well done financial report. We had a very successful year.
 - There were a lot of MCSC gift certificates issued. This needs to be discussed further.
- Hospitality / Registration Janet Moyer said she thought things went well. We need a few more volunteers for the Chance Board and for the Silent Auction next year. Perhaps a floater to give the volunteers a break (not just the dealers).
- A raffle topic was presented and subsequently tabled.
- Lunches Kathryn Storey announced that all went well, but next year we will double-count the lunches before leaving Jason's. The new process worked well.
- Mail-Out Stanley Christmas will look through the registration slips and form a list for next year.

- Mixture Pick Table This area did fine and brought in record donations. The stamp bags sold pretty well. We should have a good supply for next year.
- Should we order specific types of stamps for next year? (Things not usually found on cancelled letters.)
- Program Kathryn Storey did a good job on the program. Next year Jeff Owens will be helping with a new program. It should work out well.
- Publicity Peter Elias announced he buys a Linn's ad, but . asked if we should continue since they no longer have a print edition. The Facebook page is helping. Stanley is going to study the registrations slips and see what people said they used to learn about the show.
- Security Ken Aldridge said it went ok this year, with a few glitches, he does need a replacement.
 - He has four radios (three work) that will be given to the secretary for storage until his replacement is found. He gave a folder of contact information to her as well.
- Silent Auction Tom Turner announced a successful year. We had only four lots that did not sell. Two that were sold were not picked up, but have been gotten to the buyers.
 - We have some lots started for next year but will need more

Chartres Cathedral, France

Last November I flew to Paris for several days. My primary purpose in going was to see the newly

restored Notre Dame Cathedral, which as everyone will recall was badly damaged by fire in 2019. At the time I originally booked the flight, it appeared likely the cathedral would be reopened to visitors by November but the timeline slid some and I ended up missing it by about three weeks.

All was not lost though, as the nearly equally famous Chartres Cathedral is only an hour and twenty minutes by train southwest of Paris. So I bought my ticket and took the 10 AM train on Sunday morning.

The cathedral is only a few blocks from the train station in Chartres and I arrived while Sunday service was still underway. Even though I'm not Catholic, it seemed that the respectful thing to do was to quietly take a seat and join in.

After the service ended and the congregation dispersed, the organist continued to play for another ten or so

minutes, while myself and a dozen or two other visitors wandered around the magnificent structure, admiring the renowned stained glass windows, altar statuary, side chapels and the famous labyrinth stonework pattern on the floor. When the organist finished I said to him, "c'était magnifique!" and he smiled and simply replied, "merci."


The main section of the present cathedral was constructed between 1194 and 1220. It was built atop the site of at least five earlier cathedrals that were lost to fire, war, or other misfortunes. The two dissimilar spires at the west entrance were built approximately 350 years apart.



Many of the magnificent stained glass windows are original, although they have been cleaned and refurbished several times during the intervening centuries. A major restoration project to clean the stonework, and perform necessary repairs and apply protective coating the windows, to was begun in 2009 and was still

underway at the time of my visit, but did not detract from the experience.

Surprisingly, I have found only a few French postage stamps that feature Chartres Cathedral. The one shown nearby, Scott #B186, is the most attractive in my

Rather than just sticking a stamp in your album when you are filling spaces, it is nice to actually look at the stamp a bit closer. The trouble is, that <u>because</u> it is a stamp, details are often lost when looking at



the stamp with just your eyes. A magnifying glass certainly helps, as you can then see the details, especially if it is an engraved stamp, such as this 150 year old postage due stamp from Peru (#J2).

At top left is how it appears to the naked eye. At left is the same image, but is now magnified by over 400% (i.e.: over double the length & width). And it's even better if it takes up my full computer screen!

To best appreciate the details, you need to set your scanner to 600 dpi or more.

Bochum

Shown above is a postcard of the Bochum, Germany main train station, circa mid-1960's. Bochum is a city of (currently) 372,348 in the German state of North Rhine-Westphalia and the 16th largest city in Germany.

Bochum dates back to the 9th Century. As it was at an important trade route junction, Charlemagne (King of the Franks) set up a royal court there. Fast forward about 1,000 years, and in 1871, the city became a part of the German Empire.

Sometime during that same time period, my greatgrandfather (on my dad's side) moved to Bochum, where my father was also born.

In 1968 I received the postcard shown above when I lived in Switzerland as a child. It was sent by my grandmother who was visiting her sister in her former hometown and sent me this card, postmarked in Wattenscheid, a part of Bochum, on 7/10/68 (see cropped address side of the post card below).

In 1984, I had an internship in Mülheim a.d. Ruhr. Since one of my "aunts" (technically a "*1st cousin once removed*" - as she was my dad's cousin) still lived in Bochum, I got to meet



her for the first time. It was only about 25 km (16 miles) from where I was staying!

I also visited her again a few years later. I didn't find this card until just a couple of months ago!

Christmas Classic: A Visit From St. Nicholas by Dan Golden

I love Christmas. From the time I was a wee lad, I have always loved the joyful time of year that exudes from the holiday. And even before I got into philately I have always enjoyed sending and receiving Christmas cards and seeing the latest iteration of Christmas stamps available. Of course, coming from a devout Catholic background, the Madonna and Child stamps are cool. but (may God forgive me for saying this) I have always liked seeing other aspects of the Christmas season depicted on stamps a little more. Be it Santa Claus, children's toys, holiday decorations, elves, or something else, they always help put me in the joyous spirit of the season. This is one of the reasons why I have such a deep fondness for the stamp set US #5644-5647, issued in 2021. I had only



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begun my stamp collecting journey in November 2021, so these were the first Christmas stamps I saw through the eyes of a stamp collector as opposed to those solely of a consumer. I fell in love with them immediately.

Based on Clement Clarke Moore's 1823 poem "A Visit From St. Nicholas," perhaps better known as "Twas the Night Before Christmas," this set features four scenes from the story that illustrate the plot.

There is the image of Santa on the rooftop, with his sack of toys over his shoulder, making his way toward the chimney, through which he will enter the house. In the next image we see Santa coming down said chimney, his legs being the only part of him visible as he is about to touch down onto the floor of the unlit fireplace, with the family's stockings hung on the mantle with care, reminding us of the anticipation every child feels on Christmas Eve. In the third image we see a headshot of Santa from straight on, and he is winking directly at us the viewer, a small gesture that almost seems to communicate that we have been let in on a secret by seeing Santa face-to-face. Finally we come to the final image, that of Santa in his sleigh being pulled by reindeer through the night sky, as he looks back at us and bids us farewell.

I am a sucker for stamps that have a lot of detail because it really hammers home the idea that stamps are miniature works of art. The more details that can be seamlessly included by the designer, the more the stamp is elevated to be a true piece of artwork rather than a fancy-looking sticker that you put on your mail. Brad Woodard, the artist behind these stamps, used a perfect blend of detail vs. simplicity to make this poem come alive and tell the story in four images. In my opinion, his work in bringing a timeless story to life makes this set a modern -day classic.

Communication of club business, i.e., minutes from each of the three monthly meetings; upcoming events; EXPO updates and decisions.

Keeping track of 3 stamp clubs and their meetings is not easy but it comes together in Stamping Around.

Which part could use improvement:

Try to get more philatelic articles by more authors to fulfill stated purpose to provide an outlet for original articles on stamp collecting and philatelic subjects. Editor Peter Elias writes most of the longer articles and monthly columns. They are informative and well-written about a wide variety of subjects. But a more diverse range of perspectives would better reflect the membership and stated purpose of the newsletter.

--> Editor: Well then readers, please send me more articles! I know that reading articles is easier than writing them ... but ...

A little light on member recognition.

--> Editor: I'll gladly publish more of this if others let me know this information as they come across it.

Some pages have nothing but type, no images. Two column reading with closely spaced lines is sometimes hard to read. Multiple columns page after page, one has to scroll down, then up, and down again.

--> Editor: Pages with only type are usually meeting minutes, which in our case are usually long & detailed and generally don't have any room for photos and graphics. I have to make all articles fit the printed page. A 1-column layout is hard to read on an 8.5" wide sheet of paper; 2 columns are about right, and 3 columns would make it look more like a newspaper. The comment is also about scrolling. The judges are most likely reading this on a small screen rather than a printed piece of paper, for which this newsletter is presently designed.



Crystal Cave

I love visiting caves whenever I am travelling. Even here in Texas we have several of them (all south of the DFW metroplex). When you search for "Crystal Caves", there are several that come up; in California, Kentucky, Ohio, Pennsylvania and even Concan, Texas, amongst several others in the USA. Then you also find that name in Western Australia, Belize, Bermuda and Mexico.

The subject of this article is the Crystal Cave that is located in (or should that be under?) Bermuda. These caves have been a tourist attraction since 1907, after their discovery in 1905. They are on privately owned property (the Wilkinson family, now a Trust, has owned these since 1884) and are open to the public.



The caves are about 1,640 feet long and 203 feet deep, with parts being below the water level.

Bermuda Scott #828 was issued in 2002 as part of a set of 4 stamps featuring Bermuda _____caves.

> So where exactly are these caves on Bermuda? Bermuda isn't just one island, it is actually several.

Bermuda Scott #924 shows an old map of Bermuda, and obviously doesn't show the Crystal Caves, as they weren't discovered until much later. Below is a Google map of Bermuda, with а "pin" at the Crystal Cave location. for which I've drawn a blue arrow on the stamp at left.

In addition to Scott #828, there is also a Bermuda postal stationery card (above) that commemorates the Crystal Caves. The picture side of the postcard shows the same photo as on the printed stamp design.

only been to Bermuda once, in October 1993 for my honevmoon. While you might think that visiting an island in the middle of Atlantic the Ocean in late fall might have lots of bad weather, it was actually fairly decent.

We stayed at the Grotto Bay Beach Resort, situated on Castle Harbor (just to the



right of the point of the red pin). The airport is on St. David's island, situated across the harbor, roughly where the word "Crystal" is at. It is connected to the island via a road on a causeway.

The Crystal Caves themselves were located only about 1,000 feet from our resort, so it didn't take long to get there. Reading up the Crystal Caves, even Mark Twain visited there once! While I love caves, I'm certainly no "spelunker" ... I prefer to walk through caves, not crawl through them (but hey, that's just me...).

I did manage to take a picture or two, one of which is shown above, along with the rather tiny entrance ticket stub.

GOTTLIEB DUTTWEILER Control March 2, 1888 – 1962 1000 HELVETIA

Gottlieb Duttweiler (1888-1962) was a Swiss businessman and politician. Born in Zürich, he started with several delivery trucks that delivered just 6 basic foodstuffs and eventually founded the

stuffs and eventually founded the Migros grocery stores, which is structured as a cooperative.

"mi" (French for mid-way) and "gros" (French for wholesale), thus meaning prices midway between retail & wholesale (...and I learned that just now while researching this!).

Migros is now Switzerland's largest retail company (US\$8.5 billion), largest supermarket chain and largest employer (99,000+); not to mention one of the forty largest retailers in the world.

The Swiss stamp above, Scott #1476 was issued to commemorate him in 2013. Coincidentally, the photo I took of the fabulous chocolate bar aisle at their Davos store, was also taken in 2013 during a vacation to Europe. Go figure...

In 1986, when I lived in Switzerland, I did become a member of the Migros Genossenschaft (i.e.: co-operative), and that did get me the book you see on the right, titled "The Adventure Migros". Over 2 million Swiss are now members.

Growing up in Switzerland in the 1960's, we always went shopping at a small Migros grocery store in our neighborhood.

The fridge in our apartment was close to dormsized from what I remember, so my mom went shopping there almost on a daily basis. Luckily, the store was only about a 1150 foot walk (5 minutes) from where we lived!

While we only had a small store then, Migros now has huge supermarkets and

even malls. When we went to Switzerland on vacation, we always stopped at the Migros "Pizolpark" shopping center in Sargans to stock up on items. Think of it as a multi-story Super Walmart (except that the quality of products is better).

Much as - 1 love Migros, when we were vacationing in Davos in 2013. we shopped across the street (where there was free underground parking offered by the competitor, which was Aldi!).
