#### **Code Confusion**

By no means am I an expert on all "codes". but I have experience dealing with them in my past professional life on the packaging engineering & quality control side of things... So when it

comes to philately and "codes", there does on occasion seem confusion as to what they are called. Now that "QR" (quick response) codes are commonplace, some people still confuse QR codes with "barcodes". A QR code is a type of "data matrix code" and uses a pattern (i.e.: matrix) of "dots" to encode the information. The QR code at top left decodes as our club's website (try it on your phone).




in a square and a smaller rectangular format as shown to the left.

Traditional postage meters also use the data matrix as shown above left.

This has been just a very brief introduction to the wonderful world of data matrix & barcodes that are used on postage and by the postal service.

Just remember that barcodes and data matrix codes are different types of codes (even if the chart below calls them all "barcodes")!



A "bar code" on the other hand uses, well, "bars". Some examples of those are the 4 codes on the right. Of the codes shown above, most people are familiar with the "UPC" (universal product code) code (2nd one from the right above) and that is used primarily for items scanned at a check-out counter in a store. The "EAN" code is the European version of the UPC code and stands for "European Article Number".

"Code 128" and "Interleaved 2 of 5" are generally reserved for industrial applications or where a "bar code" is needed for things such inventory item numbers, vendor codes, serial numbers, etc.

Not shown above though, is a type of bar code used by the USPS, and that is the "Postnet" code, a series of short & long dashes that you see on the bottom of envelopes and which are used to codify the destination zip code, as shown below in a cropped scan of an envelope that I recently received.



In the "Types of 2D Barcodes" illustration diagram above, the



2nd code from the left is a "PDF417" code which is used by the USPS . FedEx and airline boarding cards and stamps.com postage as shown at lower left.

#### Pocket Knives & Jeans

As I was flipping through one of my Swiss Postal Service yearbooks for 2006, I saw the stamp you see on the left, Scott #1248. This was part of a set of 2 that commemorated Swiss Army Knives.

Looking through one of my desk drawers, I found one of my old Victorinox Swiss Army Knives. It is virtually identical to the one shown on the stamp, the major difference being mine doesn't have. what appears to be, the screw driver that is shown to the right of the saw blade.

But given that there's at least 100 different models of these knives with a variety of different functions (and from two manufacturers, Wenger & Victorinox), I'd say it's a pretty good match! This knife I've used so much, that the cross logo on the red side has worn off (although there's an outline barely visible if you look at it in person).






And to top it off, the photo above was also used in a of 20 sheet "PictureItPostage" stamps that I ordered a few years back, when rates were still 37¢

#### **Expensive Stanley Gibbons Catalog**

On February 26, I was at the large Half Price Books store in Dallas.

usual, their regular As 'collectibles" section did not contain anything of interest (just a few older catalogs and general stamp collecting book by Sutton).

When I was in the section where more expensive books were inside a locked glass cabinet, I saw that this 2004 (13th edition) copy of a Stanley Gibbons "Great Britain, volume 1, Queen Victoria" stamp catalog.

Looking at the price tag, I couldn't believe what I saw: \$200 ! I mean, what on earth would make that 18 year-old catalog worth that kind of money; it's not as if Queen Vic

herself autographed it...

Poking around the internet. I do find that various editions of this book, even ones back to 1996 do seem to carry a hefty price tag of \$40 or so. On www.abebooks.com, I found a used copy of this book (soft cover) for \$66.09 + \$6.44 for shipping (and about half that price for the hardcover version). While that's still fairly pricey, it is a long ways from \$200!

I didn't really have time though to engage a store employee as to why the price was priced so high. Caveat emptor!

#### Tired of the Machins?

For those of you who have been complaining about the British definitive "Machin" stamps which feature the profile of Queen Elizabeth II, something new (well, relatively new) is in the works. Effective January 31, 2023, the Machins as we know them will no longer be valid for postage. They are being replaced by new Machin stamps which include a barcode next to the Queen's head.

The reports I have read indicate that the barcode can be scanned with your cell phone and will link you to a site containing an animation or information the Royal Mail deems appropriate. The barcode is also a unique identifier for each piece of mail to be used to provide tracking services to help cut down on mail theft or things that get "lost in the mail".

I would assume the Royal Mail would be able to track any individual who uses a credit or debit card to purchase the stamp, or perhaps even link cash purchases by utilizing facial recognition technology at the point of sale and provide tracking from origin to destination.

Supposedly, some of the barcoded stamps were used over the last Christmas season to give the new stamps a "trial run". I haven't seen any of these as of yet, however, they might make an interesting addition to your collection if you are so inclined.

The new Machins will come in a series of new colors which should come as no surprise to Machin collectors. The regular first-class stamps will be purple; second-class will be green; first-class large letters stamps will be turquoise; second-class large letters stamps will be dark green.

Royal Mail encourages their customers to use their non-barcoded stamps prior to their expiration date, however they are also offering a "Swap Out" beginning on March 31, 2022 where you can exchange the old stamps for new ones. If the Brits are having the same problem with counterfeit stamps that we are in this country, they may get more stamps back than they produced.

#### What is it worth?

Pretty much most stamps collectors have seen this stamp at some point, Germany #510 from 1941, one of the 24 stamps in a set of what we call "Hitler Heads", that were issued between 1941 to 1944, in denominations ranging from 1 pfennig to 5 Marks.

The lower denominations, such as the 6 pf violet/purple stamp shown here, were typographed, while values starting at 10 pfennigs were engraved. Values starting at 25 pfennigs were slightly larger as well. All values from 1 to 80 pfennig have just the "minimum" catalog value of 25¢ in MNH condition; the 1 Mark being 45¢, and the 2 to 5 Mark being \$1.60 to \$3.25 in the 2018 Scott catalog. So basically, all of the lower values are pretty much worthless from a dealer perspective.

So where am I going with this? Well, for the first time in living in the DFW area for over 32 years, I had a chance to go to the "First Monday Trade Days" in Canton. At one of the dealer booths, I saw a guy that had a few stamps for sale, and he was proudly selling various Hitler head stamps, such as the one shown for around \$5 each, stating that they were "vintage World War II" stamps. Yes, that they are, but No, they are not worth the kind of price he wanted. He even had a somewhat tattered strip of 10 from the edge of a sheet that was only \$85! Yikes.

I was trying to explain to him that he is way overpricing these stamps, and his explanation is that people are buying them from him at those prices, but he wasn't budging on lowering any prices. I would not want to be one of the hapless buyers years from now when they think that they're sitting on valuable WWII artifacts that are worth something! That said, I've got at least 20 of the stamp shown above, all in pristine MNH condition in one of my stock books. If I ever go back to the "Trade Days", maybe I could sell him mine for only a \$1 each, since he could still make a profit selling them for \$5. But that wouldn't seem right, would it? So, when you see someone selling really cheap stamps for outrageous prices, what do YOU do or say to the seller? Caveat Emptor!

anything being mentioned about "denominated" stamps.

I'd have to believe that there is still going to be a need for denominated Machins, so that people can use those for various rates that are outside of "1st-class", etc.

Just as here in the USA, I use FOREVER stamps to pay for part of the postage along with many older denominated stamps to cover the full rate.

Another question is: if you buy a sheet (or booklet of these stamps), for Royal Mail to track this back to the purchaser of the stamps, wouldn't EVERY stamp on a sheet or booklet have to be scanned in order to trace it back to the purchaser? What if one person buys these for a small store for example, and then sells them on to their customers to use, then that they wouldn't really have actual traceability of who used them, only who bought them, would they?

dle of the falls, and you can climb it, which I did, but don't have a photo of that (except for one I took of my supervisor). I have no clue as to who the people in the boat, my supervisor was sitting behind me.

In 2015, Switzerland issued this nice triptych of stamps featuring the Rheinfall (Rhine Falls as we call them), Scott #1558. The falls have also been featured on other Swiss stamps, such as Scott #234 from 1936, and also #225 from 1934.

The Rhine Falls are located in northern Switzerland, in Neuhausen am Rheinfall (just south of

the city of Schaffhausen, near the German border). The falls were located only about 38 miles from where I lived during my (almost) 10-month "work vacation" in 1986 (i.e.: I worked Monday-Friday's, and had a 2-day vacation in Switzerland almost every weekend!).

At one point in 1986, I took the picture shown above (well, one of several, this is the best). Obviously taken after dark, I had to position my 35mm film camera (no digital cameras back then!) on a ledge and took several photos of varying exposure lengths. As a result, the water had a nice "foamy" look to it!



I took the picture to the right at a later time during 1986, when I visited there with my new supervisor.



The Rhine Falls (#1 on the map) is along the Rhine River is the 2nd longest river in Central & Western Europe at 760 miles in length. It starts in the Swiss alps (#2) and continues through the Bodensee (i.e.: Lake Constance), westward a bit, then north, dividing Germany & France and exiting to the North Sea in the Netherlands.

I've been to the Rhine Falls several times, not just in 1986, but always on the northern side; I've never had a chance to visit whatever castle is situated on the south side, although there is a viewing platform there as well.

On the map above, #2 shows where the Rhine River originates from various sources in the Grisons region of the Swiss Alps. The picture I took shown on the left is of the Rhine Gorge (sometimes called the "Grand Canyon of Switzerland") that is on the "Vorderrhein" tributary, not to far from Flims, where we once vacationed in 1983 and went hiking in the area (from the top all the way to the river edge), during the last major hiking vacation with the parents when we were younger.

As always, one stamp (a strip of 3 in this case), triggered a whole of memories for me!

The meeting adjourned at 8:45 PM.




#### Stamps In The News - Ukraine

I tried to access the Ukrainian postal service website, but can't seem to access it on my Windows 10 computer, regardless of whether I'm using Chrome, Firefox or the AVG Secure Browser; yet, on my Android Smartphone, I can get to their website using the phone's Chrome browser, every time it briefly flashes up a set of links on the left side, then a white screen with a bouncing Ukraine postal service logo. I haven't figured this out yet... Although a friend of mine has been able to see that website fully without any problems on his Windows 10 PC and Chrome.



the wife of King Christian V of Denmark.


The Virgin Islands were a possession of Denmark up until 1917 when they were purchased by the United States.

In 1493, Christopher Columbus discovered the Virgin Islands on his second voyage to the New World. He claimed them for Spain, however, the Spanish did not establish any settlements there.

In the 1600's, Denmark, the Dutch Republic (the Netherlands), England and France all established settlements in the islands. Denmark set up a permanent settlement on the island of St. Thomas in 1672, followed by a settlement on St. John in 1717. In 1733, they purchased St. Croix from the French.

Pat and I vacation there a number of years ago. We stayed at the Frenchmans Reef resort where the picture was taken from, looking across the bay to Charlotte Amalie.

The U.S. stamp showing Charlotte Amalie is Scott #802, issues on December 15, 1937 (along with stamps for the other territories of Hawaii, Alaska & Puerto Rico).



Do you remember these (or similar items)?:




