## The Freedom We Enjoy

Over the last decade or so, it would seem as if America is slowly pulling itself apart at the seams. Our last three presidential elections have been marked by controversy at best, and violence at worst. Sensationalist news outlets care more about clicks and views instead of quality content with honest journalism. Combined with algorithm-driven social media platforms, this has forced virtually every American into one camp or the other, either Democrat or Republican, forever pitted against one another with no middle ground. And the hatred and vitriol that has been spewed back and forth between our elected officials is disgraceful and only serves to divide us further.

But this is not limited to those in office. We are seeing it amongst ordinary people as well. My family, most of whom are democrats, has a family-wide group text chat. This year on the morning after the election, with

With that in mind I would like to use this article to attempt the impossible: bridge the chasm that divides us and remind us of what we all share as Americans. I want to bring us all together in the best way I know how, by talking about stamps. I recently came across the Norman Rockwell souvenir sheet, USA #2840, which depicts a set of his paintings known as The Four Freedoms. Painted during World War II, each portrays an ideal for which ordinary Americans had gone overseas to defend abroad.

At the time of their release, these paintings had an inspirational effect that galvanized the American people and focused their energy behind a singular cause: the war effort. We as a country all rallied around the flag as one united people. Black or white, man or woman, we all recognized one another first and foremost as Americans who were with us in the fight. Given the current climate of our country (and that I'm writing this on

> Veteran's Day) I think it would be wise to reflect on these ideas again and remember what it is that those men fought and died for.

> There is the Freedom of Speech. We have the freedom to share our viewpoints communicate our ideas with others without the fear of condemnation. We have a press that is (ideally) free from

censorship or added political agendas. When something bothers us we have every right to speak up and let our opinions be known without the fear of retribution. We are able to make our voices heard.

content of the commonplace. Gusps 1993

There is the **Freedom of Worship**. We are free to worship according to whatever creed we choose to believe in. No one can tell us or force us to follow one faith over another. We all have a right to choose what we believe and worship whatever God in whatever manner we prefer. Not only do we expect such a personal choice to be accepted, but we expect that our right to choose our own faith protects us from religious persecution.

There is the **Freedom from Fear**. This stamp depicts two children being peacefully tucked in bed by their parents, while the father holds a newspaper with a headline describing the horrors of The Blitz. Despite the bombing and destruction across the pond, these two

fascist" (this was the cleanest comment I could find, use your imagination for some of the others).

I found the same atmosphere at the office when I went to work that morning, with some co-workers labeling Trump voters as "traitors" and others calling Harris voters "mentally unstable". Overall, there was gloating on one side and threats of violence from the other. I was appalled, not at the election's results, but at the things being said and shared back and forth. Does this not resemble the same hateful speech seen four years ago when Biden defeated Trump, or even eight years ago when Trump defeated Hilary Clinton?

I cannot help but wonder, what happened to us? Have we not learned our lesson? Have we not figured out how to come back together, post-election, as Americans who love their country and their fellow countrymen? If we have not, how can we ever expect to heal and grow? How can we ever expect to be anything other than the

children are able to rest easy without fear because they know they will not wake up tomorrow with the war on their doorstep. They know they are safe and secure.

Before moving on, I would like to point out that in some ways it almost appears as if we have taken a step back as a society. Facebook puts certain individuals in "Facebook jail," temporarily blocking their accounts for posting something that they do not approve of. More broadly we have seen the rise of "Cancel Culture" from social media in which people who act or speak in a manner deemed unacceptable by enough people are then silenced, boycotted, or otherwise shunned. People on one side of the aisle treat Jews and Muslims as though they are not fully human, while people on the other side of the aisle seem to view Christianity with disdain and wish to destroy it. For example, I have personally been called a "far-right extremist" for the radical crime of being Catholic. And these days, politicians stir up the populace with not-so-subtle warnings about fascist or communist dictatorships that would result from voting for the other party. Unfortunately, the more politicians say such things, the more people will believe them. As a result, I am more fearful than ever that another civil war is brewing around the corner. Not to mention ongoing conflicts across the world in Ukraine and Gaza, and further tense relations with Russia, Iran, China, and North Korea threaten to pull us into another war as well. Indeed, it seems as if each of these three here-to-fore mentioned freedoms is under attack in some way.

But allow me to move on to the fourth freedom. the Freedom from Want. Depicted on this stamp is a multi-generational family gathered around the table for what appears to be a Thanksgiving dinner. As Thanksgiving approaches in our own lives, I believe we all ought to take a step back from the divisive political headlines, the fallout from the election, and instead take a moment to consider everything we have to be grateful for. We live in a free society. Despite how we may feel toward certain politicians from one party or another, we live in a country that values our opinion and gives us a means to seek and accomplish change. If you are among those who are upset by the results of this latest election, take a moment to be thankful that we live in a democratic society in which your voice can be heard and our politicians can be voted out of office! The freedom we enjoy as Americans is something so few people throughout history have ever experienced. God has blessed us in ways that billions of people around the world can only dream of, and billions more throughout the centuries could never have imagined.

These freedoms that we fought for in World War II are just as pertinent to our lives today as they were back then. We owe it to the courage and sacrifice of good men who believed in what they fought for since 1776, through the Civil War, both World Wars, and even right up to the present day. We enjoy the same freedoms today and share the same responsibilities to *build* a more perfect *union*, not let ourselves be divided into opposing camps

## Venetian Glass

Venetian glass, such as shown on Italy, Scott #3788 from 2021, is generally made on the Island of Murano, which is situated a little over ½ mile northeast of Venice.

The stamp shows a particular glass item made by Venini, one of several companies making glassware. These stamps were issued in small panes and individual

stamps could be separated as singles with a margin by use of rouletting or removed for mailing as they were also self-adhesive and die-cut.

Venetian glass production on Murano Island dates back to the 13th century and has a lot of innovations. It was the major European center for luxury glass items from the Middle Ages to the Renaissance. They developed an almost transparent glass in the 15th century, as well as a "milk glass" that looked like porcelain.



Back in 1986, I took a brief vacation in August and drove to Venice. Being a typical tourist (and only having a very small budget), I did buy a small glass item there, shaped like a Venetian gondola (and also doubles as an ashtray). I don't recall the details, but it was made of Murano glass from what I remember, although I probably bought it at a souvenir shop in Venice as I don't recall taking a ferry over to Murano Island (but I'll have to review my old photos to double-check on that...).

### 1993 & 2009

St.Vincent

532 years ago, on August 3, 1492, Columbus set sail across the Atlantic, and 70 days later, on October 12, 1492, he "discovered" the Bahamas, thinking it was the "East Indies".

In all, Columbus made 4 voyages across the Atlantic, and



He never really got close to what is the continental USA.

Columbus and his voyages were featured on various stamps from around the world; in the USA, the most important issue was the set that commemorated 400th Anniversary in 1892.

Columbus' 3 ships on the 1st voyage were the Nina, Pinta & Santa Maria. The Santa Maria was lost when it

> hit reefs off the coast of Haiti around Christmas of 1492.

> Later voyages included more ships, including the Nina & Pinta on the 2nd voyage.





By 1992, a set of 3 full-size replica ships were built in Spain, using the materials that would have been

used in the 15th Century.
A few modifications were made to adapt them to modern times, such as slightly taller ceilings and modern engines for emergency use.

The ships toured Spain,

France, Italy & Portugal before crossing the Atlantic and visiting various US coastal cities. One of the stops was in Corpus Christi, Texas!





I had a visit to Corpus Christi in July 1993 and got to see the 3 ships myself. My 1st thought was how really small they were! We did get to go on board.

A year later, a barge hit the Pinta & Santa Maria causing a lot of damage (all above water), were considered too expensive to repair and were destroyed in 2014 (parts of which were used to repair the Nina).

16 after years after my 1993 trip (in July 2009), I was in Corpus Christi again, and was able to visit one of the ships that was at the Corpus Christi Museum of Science & History at that time (see picture at left; all other pictures are from 1993).

The Nina partially sank in 2017 after Hurricane Harvey, and it was finally dismantled in Corpus Christi Bay on January 16, 2020. A sad ending.



## My First Penny Blacks

These items in my collection are far from ideal. I just wish I still had the beauty that I once owned.

Many collectors get into the hobby collecting whatever worldwide stamps they are able to obtain. Over time, as the volume increases, they decide to specialize, by country or topic or some other category. I, on the other hand, began collecting only the stamps of Great Britain, where I was growing up. Later I broadened my interests to include the British Commonwealth, and many years after that, thought "Why restrict myself to that?"

At my school we had a very active stamp club, but it didn't help my new ambition to possess a penny black. One year, well before I was old enough to drive, I was with my parents on summer vacation in Boscombe, near Bournemouth, and saw a sign "Stamps for Sale" in the window of a tailor's shop. The elderly owner showed me three penny blacks, and we picked out the best one with four wide margins. He told me that he would improve it, took his long tailor shears, and while I nervously watched, he trimmed the right margin. I still marvel that he was able to increase the value of a stamp by removing part of it, but it did end up being perfectly centered.

He also sold me some mint never hinged King Edward VII stamps. In answer to my question, he told me that he had bought them at the post office. I still have these stamps from the years 1902-1911, and I am the second owner!


Now for the sad part of the story. In my twenties, I was offered a job in St. Louis, and jumped at this first opportunity to be in the USA. The company paid my moving expenses, and their contractors came to my apartment to pack my clothes, many books, as well as my album of used GB. They marked the side of one of the crates with a red X. When I received this shipment at my new location, one of the crates was damaged but had been mended with lots of adhesive tape. In all the excitement of moving, it was weeks before I realized that my stamp album was missing.

Clearly the red X was there to help these criminals extract my stamp album, and I was too late to report the theft. Fortunately I had left my mint stamps with my parents.

Been There, Done That

Aarberg

Aarberg is a small town in central Switzerland, about 12 miles northwest of Bern and is located at a bend in the Aare River.

The Swiss postal stationery card above has a pictorial inset at upper left showing a scene from the central part of this historic town.


Recent population data (2020) reports that the town has a population of 4,626. The building shown on the postcard (just to the right of the fountain) is Aarberg Castle (while it doesn't look like a grand structure as one would imagine a "castle" to be, that is what it is called). The tower is a part of the castle.

The town history goes back to as far as 1183, but the town itself was founded between 1220 and 1225 by count Ulrich III of Neuchatel (about 20 miles to the west) and was mentioned as "Arberc" in 1236. There is a bunch of history relating to Aarberg, more than I have room for here, so feel free to visit Wikipedia at <a href="https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Aarberg">https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Aarberg</a>.

Back in 1986, my boss drove me to Aarberg to have a tour of the Aarberg Druckfarben (Aarberg Printing Inks) company plus a lunch with company executives that, from what I remember, included at least 3 different types of alcohols (one for each course). Needless to say, it was a long lunch (good thing I wasn't driving).

So why was I there? In 1986, I worked for a new American division of Alusuisse (aka "Swiss Aluminum Corp.") and was in Kreuzlingen most of the time. As part of my training, we did go to see various vendors of Alusuisse, and the Aarberg Printing Ink Company was one of them.

Several years later, back in the USA, Alusuisse Flexible Packaging (KY) laid off about 20 employees in January 1990 (what a great way to start that decade...). So I made a call back to my former boss. A short while later I was hired as the "System Manager" of the new American division of Aarberg Printing Inks (formerly Strahan Ink & Lacquer), which had a plant in Grand Prairie (TX), Kingsport (TN), Richmond (VA) and a Corporate office in Irving (TX). After seeing that there was no



snow here in February (compared to Kentucky at the time), that was pretty agreeable with me.

So I moved to Texas and worked at both of the Texas locations until 1992.

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## **Austria Stamp Innovations**

Perusing some of the current new stamp issues that are available, I saw a bunch of "interesting" stamps available from Austria, and figured I'd check them out in person. They were

ordered via <a href="https://www.wopa-plus.com">https://www.wopa-plus.com</a>, which is a website that represents & sells stamps from various postal administrations (the orders are fulfilled from the individual countries directly though). WOPA++ is headquartered in Gibraltar.

I've bought some Austrian stamps in the past (they also offer some CVP items!). In 2005, they issued the embroidered stamp featuring an Edelweiss at right (which I used in a 1-page miniexhibit that was shown at this year's EXPO).



Shown in this article will be several stamps that Austria has issued between 2022 and 2024.

First up is the "beer coaster", shown to the left. It is an actual beer coaster, made of absorbent material, just the like ones you find in bars. It is shown in reduced size, as it is about 4x4 inches. In the middle is a stamp that can be used as postage with die-cuts that are approx. equivalent to perf. 3 (3 peaks across 2 cm).

In the middle is a view of the backside, showing the die-cuts. The die-cut area includes a "lick 'n stick" adhesive layer, which can't be seen in a scan, but shows up as a "glossy" area in the photo below.

The stamp has a €3.50 (~\$3.69) denomination, features a mug of beer and the inscription "beer has got everything".

That "everything" is described in the margin area, such as that beer contains Bvitamins, 45% of daily magnesium, 20% of potassium and easily digestible carbohydrates (needed for quick energy). So there you go!

Then there is pandemic era stamp from 2022 that encourages the use of certain vaccines, with the inscription saying "Doesn't hurt at all!"

The stamp is in the form of a bandage. It appears to be made of a gauze type of material, with the middle part being a bit thicker and containing the bandage material and the left & right edges being self-adhesive.



The printing method was via inkjet according to <a href="www.post.at">www.post.at</a>. The front & back are shown at actual size. Face value is €2.75 (~\$2.90).

Austria had issued other Covid related stamps, one in the form of a mask and the other made of toilet paper ... 'cause you know: hoarding!

Also in 2022 came the "Postlerhemd" stamp (loosely translating as postal worker shirt). And yes, it is made of rag paper that is made from recycled uniform shirts & textile waste according based on a centuries-old tradition in the last-of-its-kind Austrian paper mil.

The stamp is traditionally perforated & gummed, and has a whopping €8.20 (~\$8.64) face value!

In addition to traditional symbols & info about "do not wash", "no ironing", and "no bleaching", it also states "for franking your mail and collect-

In 2024, Austria issued a stamp in the form of a wool hat.

This time, the stamp is self-adhesive and features die-cutting. The denomination is  $\leq$ 4.30 ( $\sim$ \$4.53).

The description at WOPA+ states:
"Our self-adhesive "wool hat" miniature sheet is something truly special. It is made from flocked paper with a winter knit pattern and has been punched to create the typical

form of a hat with a pom-pom". I'd argue that this is a "stamp", not a "sheet"... It is shown in actual size.

Unlike the other 3 stamps, this one has the country name in English (as opposed to the usual *Österreich*). I'm not sure why they sometimes do this.

Austria post states that this is part of a series of "philatelic clothing" stamps; the others include a "mitten" (2021), "snow boots" (2024) and "jumper" (2023), by which they mean "sweater".

While all of these products are valid postage in Austria, it would be interesting to see any of these actually doing postal duty on letters or packages!

I tried to find some of Austria's current postage rates, and for the €8.20 postal worker shirt stamp, that rate appears to be for a "large" international letter up to 2 kg (4.4 lbs). For the €3.50 beer stamp, that appears to be an add-on rate for the Austrian domestic registered fee. Since most registered mail is NOT "machined", that's a good thing, since this stamp is so thick, that either the stamp or mail piece would damaged if machined! Austria has definitely issued some interesting stamps, and they could make the beginning of an interesting exhibit!


- A letter from the ATA with deficient postage (36¢) but got here anyway.

Some of you may be wondering, what is Clark Central Parts Division? At the time, it was a European parts

warehouse for Clark Equipment Corporation (USA) that shipped spare parts to European and northern African customers.

Clark Equipment was founded in 1916 in the USA and manufactured various material handling equipment, such as excavators & forklift trucks. There is a bunch of history about the company, being sold in 1995 to Ingersoll Rand, then Doosan International in 2007 and finally to Hyundai Genuine Group in 2021. But for me, what matters is 1984. In addition to being immersed in German daily living (which I had never done), my internship at the company involved various little studies relating to optimizing things in the warehouse. My key study was optimizing how large pallets of parts were done. At the time, it was with heavy triple-walled corrugated boxes, which were needed since the pallet was held together with steel straps. I proposed using "stretch wrap" instead and thus reducing the need for triple-corrugated boxes (to just single or double-corrugated). I had a trial stretch-wrap machine brought in, we put together a fairly heavy pallet, and had the forklift truck operator drop it while driving. Nothing fall apart! I was able

erator drop it while driving. Nothing fell apart! I was able to save the company money by saving on heavier boxes and it was also a safety issue: steel straps, if they snap or break under pressure... well, that could be painful.

Now, one of the pieces of equipment that

Now, one of pieces of equipment that Clark manufactured is familiar to many people: the "Bobcat". Since I didn't have any 1984 pictures of one. I did find one parked on the side of the road near where I live (see to the left).

And while I did have a small die-cast model of a Bobcat, it seemed to disappear, but I still have the Bobcat winter jacket that I bought from the company in Mülheim in 1984!



When doing these articles, where I match (usually) a stamp to something in my life, there are other philatelic items that can also be involved on occasion. To wit: postage meters.

While doing some house cleaning recently, I came across a folder from 1984 from Clark Central Parts Division in Mülheim a.d. Ruhr (a.d. = "on the") in North Rhine-Westphalia. Ruhr is the name of the river that runs through the city. That said, there is also a "Mülheim am Rhein", and a couple of others Mülheims. At present, the population in Mülheim a.d. Ruhr is about 175,000.

In my folder, the envelope with the Clark meter related to Clark wanting some additional information regarding my working for them at an internship between October 1 to late December 1984.

At that time, I was working towards my Bachelor of Science degree in Packaging Engineering at MSU (Michigan State University). While "education" and a degree are good things to have, practical work experience puts a feather in that cap!

While there were some internships available via the MSU School of Packaging, I got mine through the German Department at the University. And while most of those are there for people learning German and getting immersed in living in Germany for a bit, this particular internship also happened to be packaging related! And while here in the USA, most internships were generally "unpaid" (or very little paid), this one had decent pay.

While the job paid well as an internship, I did of course have expenses, such as flying to Germany & back, local transportation (I bought a car), and rent & meals to the landlord, whose family was my host and also worked at Clark. Some other perks included 1 week of paid vacation (equivalent to 4 weeks per year) and medical & dental benefits; things you normally do not get with short-term internships here in the USA. My work ID is below.

## Castello di Mesocco

Mesocco is a that is village along the main route you would be taking if driving from eastern German-speaking Switzerland (such as Zürich) Lugano, southern speaking part.

Despite 1,323 residents in 2020, that hasn't drastically changed since 1701, when there were 1,013 people!

The <u>Castello di Mesocco</u> is shown on Switzerland Scott #B135, from 1944. The castle (which is just south of the <u>current</u> village) was built in the 12th Century; however, human settlements in the area date back to 6,000 BC. The castle ruins are one of the larger ones in the Canton of Graubünden (Grisons).

In late September 1984, I was en-route to Mühlheim a.d. Ruhr (Germany) to start a 3-month internship (October to December). Prior to that though, I thought I'd do some sightseeing. My trip there began in Detroit and took me to Luxembourg on Iceland Air.

Particularly, I wanted to go to Switzerland and I had 2 weeks to do so. Since I was still in college at that time, there was not much spare change available.



### USPS 2025 Rate Increases

According to a Press Release by the USPS on November 15, 2024: The Postal Service filed notice with the Postal Regulatory Commission (PRC) for Shipping Services price changes to take effect January 19, 2025. The proposed adjustments were approved by the Governors of the USPS this week. The change would raise Shipping Services prices approximately 3.2 percent for Priority Mail service and Priority Mail Express service, 3.9 percent for USPS Ground Advantage and 9.2 percent for Parcel Select.

## **USS** Constitution

The "USS Constitution" is the world's oldest still commissioned naval warship that is still afloat!

The ship, also known as "Old

Ine snip, also known as "Old Ironsides" is a heavy frigate and was launched in 1797 (as per USA Scott #951 from 1947). It was the 3rd of 6 frigates that was constructed.

The ship is most noted for her actions in the War of 1812 (against Britain) where she defeated 5 British warships, one of which earned her the name of "Old Ironsides".

While the Constitution was retired from active service in 1881, she was designated a museum ship

in 1907. If you were around in 1934, you could have seen her in one of 90 ports during a 3-year tour. In 1997, for her 200th anniversary, she was still able to sail under her own power!

These days, she is usually found in the Boston harbor at Pier 1 of the former Charlestown Navy Yard. And that is where I saw her in August 1998 during a visit to Boston (during some "off time" while on a business trip). Back in those days one had to stay over a Saturday night in order too save on airfare, so a perfect time to check out the ship!
