

Been There, Done That

RhB By Peter Elias



The RhB is a narrow-gauge (1 meter) regional train system in southeastern Switzerland

and runs in the Graubünden (Grisons) canton, which includes cities such as Chur (capital), Landquart, Davos, Arosa, St. Moritz and others.

The SBB (<u>S</u>chweizerische <u>B</u>undes<u>b</u>ahn = Swiss Federal Railway) is the largest train company in Switzerland. Of the regional companies, RhB is the largest. The original route was planned from Landquart to Davos and work started on June 29, 1888 and completed to Klosters in 1889; the continuing segment to Davos followed later, and additional segments in the region were completed over the years into the early 1920's. And as you might have guessed, I have ridden on the RhB; many

times actually. When I was actually living in Switzerland, we didn't use it often, but did a couple of times in the late 1960's. However, once we moved to the USA, we went back on vacation to Switzerland



many times, and invariably went to vacation in the Grisons area (usually Davos) many times in the 1970's and until 1983. We only rented a car to get us from the airport to Davos, and then used the train for the next few weeks. The picture above shows me (in 1981) leaning out of an RhB train as we are nearing Davos. Back then, their trains were mostly green, now they're red. This picture is actually a screen shot from an older Super8



film (I didn't have video back then).

After the mid-1980's, anytime I went to Switzerland, I always had a rental car, so I didn't get to use the RhB much, however, in 2013, Annie, Marcos & I went to Davos and here's a photo of Annie (and partial of Marcos) just after the train had left the Filisur train station. A video screen shot of that train arriving is shown to the right where Marcos is on the left & Annie in the middle.





Below is another picture of the RhB train where we got off at one of the "suburbs" of Davos and subsequently took a chairlift up the mountain for a day hike down to Sertig Dörfli. All I can say is, if in Switzerland; use their trains! They're generally on-time to the minute and the scenery can't be beat!

Editor's Forum

Please see my article on page 3 about skewed images. When illustrating an article with images of stamps and covers, I often do have to "tweak" the image by:

- 1) Rotating it to "square it up".
- 2) Cropping extraneous items out, such huge black (or other color) borders.
- 3) Fixing various minor flaws if needed using Photoshop Elements.
- 4) Enhancing the image, by increasing or decreasing the contrast, brightness, etc.


However, what I can't easily do is fix an image that has a poor "perspective" (think of a road that is going towards the distance. In real life, the edges of the road are parallel, but a photo often shows the road growing to a point in the distance. Only a picture taken from above and not at any sort of an angle would produce an image of a road with its sides being parallel. Same goes with photograph a stamp at close-up range (i.e.: just a couple of inches away). Even if you can hold the camera perfectly parallel to the stamp surface, most lenses will have a "wide-angle" perspective and you'll get a skewed stamp.

Would You Visit Prune Island?



So, would you visit "Prune Island"? Well, with a name like that, most people would probably say no. But judging by the 4 stamps (Scott #123-126 on the Grenadines of St. Vincent First Day Cover), it sure doesn't look like a bad place to relax for a day or three!

Note that on the 35¢ and \$1 stamps above, they refer to the "Palm Island Beach Club" and the "Palm Island Resort" which are ON "Prune Island".

Originally, Prune Island was unoccupied and had swamps and mosquitoes. In 1966, a John Caldwell and his wife took out a 99-year lease of the island from the St. Vincent government, and proceeded to plant palms. John seemed to have developed a habit of planting palms and was soon nicknamed "Johnny Coconuts". As a result of the palms, the name "Prune Island" was soon forgotten and it became known as "Palm Island". A 10-bedroom hotel named the Palm Island Beach Club was constructed.

By 1999, the structures on the island were falling down and were replaced by newer ones by the new owners. Now there is a 41-room hotel, a modern Spa, swimming pools, tennis courts and more. The 135 acre island is now a luxurious holiday destination (see https://dxnews.com/i88pi_palm/formore.info).



created a series of 7 stamp booklets, each with 4 different face values; one booklet for each of the main "Grenadines of St. Vincent" islands, which include: Bequia Island, Canouan Island, Mayreau Island, Mustique Island, Petit St. Vincent, Prune Island & Union Island.




E a c h booklet pane features a combination of different face values for that island. The scan below shows the cover of the Prune Island booklet and

the 35¢ value (Scott #106) is shown in the left column. See the blue arrow which points to the location of Prune Island near the southern end of the Grenadines of St. Vincent island chain.

Also shown above is the back of the booklet, as well as the inside back cover (slightly reduced), which shows all the main postage rates in effect at that time. As you can see, the stamps' denominations of 5ϕ , 10ϕ , $35\phi \& 45\phi$ all corresponded to actual postage rates!

As someone who likes St. Vincent maps as a very sideline hobby, it's nice to have maps-on-stamps from my favorite island!



So is (was) there a post office on "Prune Island"? Perhaps only on the day that this first day cover was done (see above). Since it is a private island, there is no official post office there.

I was almost tempted to make this a "Been There..." article, but it would have really been a "Almost Been There..." article. Yes, I have been to the main island of St. Vincent twice, in 1994 and also in 2007 as part of an annual philatelic club meeting of the British Caribbean Philatelic Study Group - how's that for a long way to go to a stamp club meeting?!. And I've even been to Bequia Island (the first Grenadines island south of the main island) twice as well on those trips, via Ferry Boat. But unfortunately,– I have never really been further south in the Grenadines than Bequia Island. Perhaps some day...

Philatelic Skewing

When submitting images of stamps (or covers), please try to avoid using a camera. Cameras, especially at close range, tend to "skew" (change the perspective of) the image.

So here is a photo that I just took of a stamp, USA #1338G, for illustrating this article.



Please keep in mind that most cameras (such as on smartphones), will horribly distort the image when taking a close-up photo. It's not easily possible to get a good squared up image unless you hold the camera very far away from the item. So please use a scanner.

Now here is a "scan" of the same stamp. Notice that is "rotated" a bit, but the perspective is ok (but the edges of top & bottom are all parallel to each other) ...

So this imagine I can easily work with and simply "rotate until it is squared up (i.e.: all corners will be at proper 90 degree angles) and then simply crop close to the actual image.

While there is software out there that can change the skewing / perspective, like in the top imagine, I don't have that, although I can easily fix a scanned image as shown here.

Been There, Done That

Lyndon B. Johnson

Just a few weekends ago (July 15 - 16, 2022), Pat and I took an overnight trip to Austin. We were going to the state convention of the American Legion. Since the Lyndon B. Johnson Presidential Library was in Austin, we decided to visit it. We had never been to a presidential library before.


Lyndon Baines Johnson was born on August 27, 1908 in a farmhouse near the central Texas town of Stonewall. In 1937, he was elected to the US House of Representatives at the age of 29. In 1948, he was elected to the US Senate and in

1953 he became the Senate Democratic leader at the age of 44. In 1960 he was elected as vice president on the Kennedy-Johnson ticket.

At 2:39 PM on November 22, 1963, one hour and 39 minutes after the death of President Kennedy from an assassin's bullet, Mr. Johnson was sworn in as the 36th President of the United States.

During his time in office, the Civil Rights Bill was passed in 1964. In 1965, Medicare was established.

After deciding not to run for re-election in 1968, he retired to his ranch in Texas. In April of 1972, he had a heart attack. After another heart attack on January 23, 1973, he died. On May 21, 1971, the Johnson Presidential Library was opened in Austin.

Stamping Around, September 2022

It's A Fact (#1 in a Series)

An estimated one million spectators watched the launch of Apollo 11 from the highways and beaches in the vicinity of the launch site. About 3.5 billion earthlings lived on this planet in 1969, and a full sixth of them - 600 million souls - watched the Apollo moon landing on TV.

NASA intended an elegantly symbolic ending to the mission. They wanted to signify the completion of the historic pledge by President Kennedy in 1961 to achieve a Moon landing before the decade was out, reminding us all that his dream was spoken just a scant eight years earlier, on May 25, 1961 when he said,

"I believe that this nation should commit itself to achieving the goal, before this decade is out, of landing a man on the moon and returning him safely to the earth. No single space project in this period will be more impressive to mankind, or more important for the long-range exploration of space; and none will be so difficult or expensive to accomplish."

Kennedy's bold initiative, rested on the success of astronaut Alan Shepard's 15-minute sub-orbital spaceflight less than three weeks earlier, and would put the United States undisputedly ahead of the Russians in the race to space. Kennedy went on to specify several items for which he sought additional funding from the Congress to help achieve this and other goals in space. By setting such a lofty goal and requesting the needed funding, he committed the nation's will and its resources to a decade-long pursuit of what at the time seemed to many an impossible goal. His speech set in motion a process that at one time employed 400,000 Americans to achieve that goal on July 20, 1969.



NASA's intention was to remind the world of President Kennedy's speech by having the Apollo 11 crew picked up by the aircraft carrier, the USS John F. Kennedy. And it would have been, except for Richard Nixon's deep seated jealousy of his now deceased rival. Nixon vetoed the plan, insisting on sending a different aircraft carrier: "The USS Hornet" (see cover above). He wanted to be on the Carrier to greet the heroic astronauts, but could not stand the idea of doing that aboard a carrier named after his nemesis.

One other interesting side fact: The idea to launch men to the moon was not set by Kennedy himself. He had asked his Vice President, Lyndon B. Johnson, to determine what he should tell the nation on that date in May, 1961!

Philatelic Firsts (Canada Semi-Postals)

Canada issued their first semi-postal stamps, B1-3, on April 17, 1974. The issue commemorates the 21st Olympic Games to be held in 1976 in Montreal.

They were printed by lithograph with a perf of 12-1/2. The latest CV I could find shows the set has a CV of \$1.65.

The very 1st Olympic Games was held in Athens, Greece in 1896. The next summer Olympic Games will be held

July 26-August 11, 2024 in Paris, France.

Luis Muñoz Marin By Pat & Bob Weidman

In the picture at bottom, Pat is at the baggage claim at Luis Muñoz Marin International Airport in San Juan, Puerto Rico. This was back in July 2021. We decided to get away for a few days and Puerto Rico was our destination. We had been through the airport a number of times, but had never visited the island.



The airport is named after Luis Muñoz Marin who was the first governor elected by the people of Puerto Rico. This happened in 1948. His inauguration was January 2, 1949. Up until that time, the governor was appointed by the U.S. President.

Governor Marin was a Puerto Rican political leader for 25 years. He was a member of the Popular Democratic Party that favored commonwealth status for Puerto Rico. During his administration, Puerto Rico became a self-governing commonwealth. In addition, the Operation Bootstrap Development Program began. Land reform, the building of roads, schools and the development of neglected areas also started.

Luis Muñoz Marin was born in San Juan on February 18, 1898 and died on April 30, 1980.

The stamps shown are USA Scott #983 (below), issued on April 27, 1949 for the first gubernatorial election in the Territory of Puerto Rico on

November 2, 1948. USA Scott #2173 (at top) featuring Governor Marin was issued in a set of definitives between 1986 to 1994.

Australian Kelpie By Pat & Robert Weidman





The nearby strip of five stamps are Australia #2874-2878, issued on June 10, 2008. They feature working dogs. The second stamp from the left is an Australian Cattle Dog, and the picture below is of our dog Bentley, who we adopted from the Ft. Worth Animal Control Center back in February.

Bentley is an Australian Kelpie, or simply Kelpie. Kelpies are used to muster livestock such as cattle, goats

and sheep and have been exported around the world for that reason. Notice the similarities between the picture of Bentley and the dog on the stamp.

The first standard for the Kelpie accepted by leading breeders and adopted by the Kennel Club of New South Wales was in 1904. There are two separate registries for Kelpies in Australia. Working Kelpies are registered with the Working Kelpie Council and/or the Australian Sheepdog Workers Association. They are bred for working ability and have a wide variety of coat colors. Show Kelpies are registered with the Australian National Kennel Council. They are bred for a certain appearance and limited acceptable colors.

The Kelpie is not a recognized breed by the American Kennel Club. The United Kennel Club and the Canadian Kennel Club do recognize the Kelpie and they can compete in official events. Kelpies have been accepted as herding dogs by the AKC as of 2015. They can compete in Sheep Herding Trials sanctioned by the AKC.

Monument Valley By Peter Elias



In August 1980, our family did a 4week long "go 10,000 west" mile trip in my dad's new Audi 5000.

This was the summer after my first year in college, so I was still able to par-

What we refer to as the "monuments", are actually called "buttes", some of which reach up to 1,000 feet in height; the elevation in the area is approximately 5,000 - 6,000 feet above sea level. Temperatures in the summer months can easily reach 100°F, so no different than what it is outside here in the

Dallas area as I am writing this article. Winters can be well below freezing (so again, not much different than the Dallas area...).

This was also an area often used in "Western" movies, such as "Stagecoach" with John Wayne from 1939, shown here on USA Scott #2448 (issued in 1990). This is all located near the "4 corners" region near the Utah-Arizona border.

One of the places we drove through was Monument Valley, which was featured on a Priority Mail stamp issued just this year, assigned as Scott #5666 (see above).

I remember that we had driven though Monument Valley, but there were no pictures in my albums from that year. However, I did find a color slide that I took (see to the right), although the color balance was getting to be a bit off after 42 years...

Dunn's River Falls By Peter Elias



Sometime between October 20 to 24 1995, I found myself at Dunn's River Falls in Ocho Rios (St. Ann Parish) on the island of Jamaica. The falls are shown on the stamp at left, Scott # 354, as part of a definitives series issued between 1972 to 1979.

Climbing these falls is a popular tourist activity (and is sometimes performed

> with the aid of guides). The falls are about 180 feet tall and 600 feet long a n d c a s c a d e downwards in a terraced fashion.

According to <u>Wikipedia</u>, the climb up can take over 1 hour! Think about it: 180 feet tall and 600 feet long will take you an hour... Certainly not a "stroll in park" (or falls in this case). Probably 1 step down for every 2 steps up!

For those that don't want to get wet or are not physically able,

there are stairs alongside the falls. Not that I wouldn't want to have done this, but we were just not prepared; we found this while driving around the northern shore of Jamaica. And certainly my camera equipment (standard old-school 35mm camera) was NOT water resistant); nor did we have any spare clothes or water shoes with us... So the picture you see at left, I took from the stairs. It was a neat place though!

As shown at bottom left, is a Google map that shows the location. During our stay in Jamaica, we were in the "Jack Tar Village", located in Montego Bay (on the northwest side of the island). Based on the Google map,

it is a 96 km (60 mile) drive from Montego Bay along a mostly 2 lane road. And given the "take-your-life-inhands" traffic conditions in Jamaica, I'm sure it took us well over an hour to get there!

The falls empty into the ocean, and are (according to Wikipedia) where the Battle of Las Chorreras took place in 1657, where a Spanish expeditionary force was defeated by the British.

The source of the water for the falls is from a spring, which due to its rich calcium carbonate content forms travertine and is one of the few travertine waterfalls that empties directly into the ocean. These are "living" falls in that they are continuously rebuilt from sediments in the water. I imagine that they are VERY slippery! I would not want to do this with bare feet, but with "water shoes" of some sort.

Jamaica is one of many countries that while it is free to enter, charges a "departure tax" (guess what, so does the USA - that fee is hidden in your international airline ticket fees...).



So here is my departure tax receipt. For "revenue stamp collectors", it is a valid item to collect. It just doesn't take the form of a revenue "stamp" in the traditional sense.

And as you can tell, the departure tax fee was 500 Jamaican dollars. Now, that's not as much as you might think. Going back to

my Quicken data from 1995, I show that I paid US\$30 (but that was for two people). My Quicken data also shows that we paid US\$10 for admission to Dunn's River Falls.

A day prior to our October 24 departure, we did stop in at the "Hard Rock Café" in Montego Bay. Not exactly the same kind of experience compared to the Hard Rock Café that existed in Dallas at the same time. I did buy the t-shirt though... I could NOT find any stamps featuring the Hard Rock Café though...

I've been to Jamaica three times and I'll have to see if I can find other pictures & stamps I can find that can illustrate my trips there! I do remember driving into the "Blue Mountains", home of the famous coffee!

How Many Stamps Do I Need?

...That seems to be main general question that people ask at Quora. If you are not familiar with it, <u>Quora.com</u> is a "question & answer" website, where users ask a question and other users chime in with answers, opinions or comments. The questions range on a wide variety of topics, and the answers can be interesting to read, as well as any ensuing "discussions" and comments that are the result.

As far as postal matters go, the one question that keeps coming up is "*how many stamps do I need*" (for sending a letter, to a certain place, etc). So it appears that these days, people seem to know nothing about "postage rates", only about "Forever" stamps and how many of them they will need.

I do on occasion answer the question, but it does get a bit tedious sometimes, since it just keeps going back to the same answer. I try to educate people on the fact that it is not just "how many stamps" you'll need, but what are you mailing (size, shape, weight, etc) and where to, and that in the end, the real question is that "how much is postage rate for mailing a particular item", not how many stamps it takes (I mean what, 1¢ stamps? \$10 stamps?). Sometimes my answer starts with that they should simply go to the USPS website and walk through the postage calculator there, since how are we Quorans supposed to know what they're mailing and where to? They ask a very general question and they'll get a general answer. Another favorite is "*when does my mailman come?*" How are we supposed to know that?

Questions like this really don't belong on Quora, as it is better to go to the "source" for questions like this (such as the USPS website), since the "answer" depends on lots of details, and people just aren't detailed enough (and I'm not going to do their work for them).

Quora is best suited (and makes for more interesting reading), when the answers to questions are opinion based, not fact based. Otherwise, Quora is an interesting place to read what other's have to say, just not for "facts". And that's the facts as I see them!
