Been There, Done That

Volunteering, V.A. Clinic, Covid-19 Pat & Bob Weidman

In the two pictures below, I am directing traffic at the Ft. Worth Veterans Affairs Clinic, where I am a volunteer. There was a drive-up to get the Covid-19 vaccine for veterans that are registered at the Ft. Worth clinic. Initially, this was being done inside the building on the second floor in the large conference room that was converted over, so that the vaccine could be given to several veterans at a time.

Then the winter storm hit in February and put everything on hold. The building sustained a lot of damage from the storm and it was closed. No one except authorized personnel are allowed inside. What to do about all the veterans with appointments to get vaccinated?



The answer was to set up a drive-up where they stay in their vehicle and proceed to the front of the building where up to eight nurses at a time are administering the Moderna vaccine. So far, several thousand veterans have received the vaccine.



To keep the line moving and eliminate the possibility of accidents, a line of travel was established by the Veterans Affairs Police. After checking in at the rear of the building, the veteran drives up to the front where I stop and hold them until given the signal to send them



Several countries have issued stamps to bring attention to the Covid-19 virus. So far the U.S. Postal Service has not. The French Polynesia stamp, Scott #1252, issued on July 31, 2020, shows two of its

citizens wearing face masks to protect them from the virus.





The other two stamps are US Scott #1825, issued July 31, 1980 for

USA 15c the 50th anniversary of the Veterans Administration and US Scott #2039, issued April 20, 1983 for Volunteering.

Campus Covers, Part 2

pated in the founding of the University of Hawaii.

Our second article on Campus Covers will use covers, stamps and news articles to show how our philatelic collections have chronicled our experiences over many generations. In addition to our family ties to Texas we share similar ties to South Carolina.

On April 26, 2001 the U.S. Post Office issued the University of South Carolina Bicentennial Stamped Post Card. As part of the recognition of the new card the University of South Carolina issued a series of picture post cards to members of the university historical society. The State Newspaper in Columbia, South Carolina ran a special article on our family ties to the University going back some 150 years and ran the article with many family photos on January 7, 2001.

We can use the newspaper

article shown to the right to show how we have used our philatelic collections to chronicle our South Carolina family campus experience. Shown below are several examples of the 2001 Bicentennial Stamped Post Card First Day Cover showing different campus scenes. Beginning the second page are examples of the ceremonial program cancelled at the University of South Carolina.

Our great uncle, Charles H. Neil, graduated from the University of South Carolina in 1903. Shown at the top of the next column are post cards showing several of the



original university buildings and posted with South Carolina related stamps at the university post office. These new philatelic items brought to mind a number of common philatelic experiences we all share as we pursue our educations.

After graduating in 1903 Charles H. Neil taught school in South Carolina. In 1917 he received an invitation to teach at Yale University and later to take a Master's Degree at Yale. In the middle of the 20th Century he partici-



Following below are philatelic items celebrating these Universities. You will see from these items how much our letters, stamps, cards and covers chronicle our learning experience. The fact that our philatelic collections provide a multigenerational record make them the perfect format for recording our story across geographic boundaries.

For Texas collectors the University of South Carolina also has a tie to the Alamo stamp of 1956. Of the defenders of the Alamo James C. Bonham of Edgefield South Carolina was a student at the University in 1826 and 1827. Texas collectors will enjoy this

German Inflation: Stamps or Coins?

While perusing my minor side-hobby of Numismatics (you know, the "other" main collecting hobby!), I looked at this wonderful 1 ounce brass (copper / bronze) German coin (shown here in approx. real size = 1.75") featuring a horse. It was minted in 1923 as "Notgeld" (emergency

money) in the German Province of Westfalen (Westphalia).



The reverse design (shown above from an image at <u>Coinshome.net</u>) commemorates *Minister vom Stein, Germany's leader ("Führer") in difficult times, 1757-1831* (this is the translation of the text around the outer edge).

The first image at the top is what I took with a small digital camera and not-so-good lighting (which is still way better though than if I tried to use my scanner); the 2nd images shows both sides of the coin but was done a bit more professionally). So, if you're needing to capture images of coins, use some sort of a light box with equal lighting from all sides and a direct overhead camera.

Other than this being a nice coin, it did make me wonder about both the denomination and the "value". As you may know, Germany experienced incredible "hyper" inflation during 1922 until November 1923.

Based on some quick "googling", on January 1, 1923, US \$1 was worth 9,000 Marks (i.e.: making this coin worth US \$1.11) on that day. On November 15, 1923, 10,000 Marks were worth US \$0.0000000238 (or something like a sliver of a penny!). But I haven't yet found the actual mintage date of this coin, although some specialty Numismatic catalogs of German Notgeld might provide an answer.

Some additional info shows this coin had also been issued in a "5 Mark" denomination dated 1921 and also a "5 Million Mark" denomination also in 1923. The 10,000 Mark coin is listed as having been minted twice in 1923, with a total quantity of 515,466. Values at <u>en.numista.com</u> has the value between approx. \$10 to \$25 depending on grade.

This is listed as being a "non-circulating" coin, meaning basically a "commemorative" coin that they

hoped you wouldn't spend. That would be sort of like the USA Silver, Gold, Platinum & Palladium "Eagle" coins issued by the US Mint, which despite having a (fairly low) denomination (\$1 for the Silver Eagles and \$5+ for the various gold & platinum coins), are legal tender, however, their denomination is outweighed greatly by their precious metal content! A \$1 Silver Eagle has currently has a silver melt value of about \$24 per troy ounce, but technically a store would only accept it as \$1. Your choice!

Ok, time to shift back to philately ... I had thought for sure that Germany would have issued a 10,000 Mark (regular or overprinted) stamp of some sort in the inflationary definitive series, such as these (or at bottom):



Above is Scott #238A to 240 that seem to jump right over the 10,000 Mark mark (yes that is correct phrasing!). Even peeking at the airmail, official & semi-postal sections of Scott's, I could not find any 10,000 Mark stamps.

Alas, I did finally find the lone 10,000 Mark stamp as a commemorative, Scott #238, which features the Cologne (Köln) Cathedral. Scott's prices this at \$0.30 in mint condition and \$4.00 in used condition. The image to the right (which I got from an eBay lot listing) shows it to be "used". My opinion would be that this is a fake postmark (just portion of an indistinct circle) at the lower right corner that was applied to make it worth more).







I do find the German hyperinflation stamps of this series (see left and some more images at <u>https://www.stamp</u> - c o I I e c t i n g - w o r I d . c o m / weimarrepublic_hyperb.html) very interesting, especially from a postal history perspective (i.e.: if on cover).

This particular series ranges from 500,000 to 50 Billion Marks (i.e.: "50 Milliarden" Marks as inscribed, since German numbers don't go from Million to Billion, they also have a "Milliarde" which is what we called Billion; so their "Billion" is our "Trillion"...). Yet German "federal" coins only went as high as 500 Marks during 1923, while banknotes had much higher denominations.

But as an investment vehicle, I'd still rather have an AU (almost uncirculated) or UNC (uncirculated) inflation coin than a mint condition stamp of the same era.

Helicopter N9498F

I was looking at some old photos, and found this one of me exiting a helicopter:



My next thought was: is there a stamp featuring this particular model of helicopter? Sadly I couldn't find any.



After a bit of research, I found that based on the registration number of N9498F, that this helicopter was a "Hughes 269C" model.

On the stamp to the left, which was part of an image from a larger eBay lot of Vietnam stamps featuring helicopters, is a Hughes

369, which has a similar glass front cabin (although this model seems have seating for more than 2 people, while the one I'm exiting only had room for 2. The stamp itself is Vietnam #1953, part of a set of 7 issued in 1988. Sometimes this is as close as it gets when writing about stamps that feature in your own life experience. At least it 1) features a helicopter and 2) from the same company and a somewhat similar style model.

But back to why I'm shown exiting the helicopter. The photo of me obviously was NOT taken at an airport. More specifically, it was in the parking lot of the building that you see below.

This photo I took from the helicopter sometime in early 1987, when I worked in Shelbyville, Kentucky (more famously known as the "home of Colonel Sanders" (as of *Kentucky Fried Chicken* fame, and whose widow still ran a restaurant at that time).

Back to Kentucky: amongst various duties (mostly Quality Control related), I had hired a helicopter from nearby Louisville, so that we could take aerial shots of the new facility (as you can tell, I'm wearing a 35mm camera around my neck - I still have this Olympus camera, but have not used it since "digital" cameras came out...).

While I've flown quite a bit on airplanes, I can count my helicopter flights on one hand (and have 2 digits to spare)! The only other helicopter flights that I can remember was a sightseeing tour on Kauai in the 1990's (I do have video of that!) and if I remember correctly, a New York Airways Sikorsky helicopter when we first moved to the USA in 1971 (and we probably took it either to/from JFK to (or from) one of the rooftop heliports in New York City, although, I'm not 100% positive of that (there are no photos that I could find, and I was only 11 years old at the time). I do remember being at the Empire State Building though, and the whole NYC thing was a bit overwhelming (when compared to having lived in Zürich before, a much smaller city, and no yellow cabs...).

The Price Of Getting Your Own Mail

I rent a PO Box from the USPS in order to keep my mail safe[r], dry and for privacy's sake.

I've rented my PO Box in Plano since early 1996. The box is big enough to hold the equivalent of 2 full reams of paper and can hold Flat-Rate envelopes without folding them (but it's not their largest box).

Back in 1996, I was still traveling a lot, and after a week of being gone, the box was mostly full every time I came back from a trip. Nowadays, I could be gone for several months and it wouldn't be full. Sad how much mail volume has decreased over the years.

As I often like to do, it's time for an analysis! So how much has this cost me over the years?

Well, back in 1996, the yearly fee for a box of the size that I rent was \$104. My box renewal for 2021-2022 just took place, and it was a whopping \$350 (compared to last year, when it was only \$288!). That's an increase of over 21% in just one year, against a current annual inflation rate of around 5%! Wow, that's quadruple the inflation rate!

Comparing the current \$350/year cost to the 1996 cost of \$104/year, that's a 336% increase! When you figure that \$104 in 1996, against its spending power today, it would be \$176 in today's money; so compared to that, the USPS rate is still double that!

But wait, there's more! It costs me way more than the \$350 in box fees each year. Bear in mind, that my PO Box is a 10-mile round trip in the car. While I don't keep an exact count of exactly how many times I go get my mail at the PO Box, over the years, it would average about 5 times per week.

So here's some simple math: 5x trips per week x 10 miles x 50 weeks per year x \$0.14 gasoline cost per mile (my car drinks premium and averages 18 mpg) = approx. \$350 per year in just gas costs (and much more if you figure in total operating costs of a car).

Ok, so we got \$350 box rental cost + \$350 gas cost for 1 year = \$700. After 25.5 years, that comes out to roughly \$17,850 ! Wow, that's a lot of money for the USPS to NOT deliver mail to my house!

And don't forget this 10 mile round-trip takes about 15 minutes each way, thus I've spent around 3,100 hours of driving to the post office in those 25.5 years !

And I've also had PO Boxes in Grand Prairie & Arlington, Texas, as well as in Shelbyville, Kentucky prior to the current box. I don't even want to figure those out...

As a side note, the USPS says it is simply trying to be competitive. Sure, my PMB (private mail box) at the UPS Store (and it's much smaller, less than half the POB size) currently costs \$360 per year! And that's for the privilege of not having FedEx, UPS & Amazon trucks drop off packages on my front door step...

While the "cost per day" for a POB or PMB may only be around \$1, as they say, after a while "you're talking about real money here"! If you rent a PO Box for a lifetime, you could easily buy a new car with that money!

Quite sobering, isn't it?
