#### **Stamp Supplies**

These days, if you want to purchase some basic stamp collecting hobby supplies at a retail store and do not have a brick & mortar stamp store nearby (and NONE in the entire DFW metro area), your choices are fairly limited\* to either a stamp show (if there was one nearby and then only during that brief time), mail order or via the internet. Then there is the "Hobby Lobby" store chain. And they do / did carry some basic items, like you see above: A beginner's album, a catalog, Supersafe hinges & Show-Gard stamp mounts, magnifying glass, stamp tongs, stock pages, and an assortment of (slightly overpriced) stamp grab bags & some topical sets. The area to the left, out of picture view, was all numismatic supplies.

Now, compare that to the picture right, at which I took March on at the 17 same store. Now barely about the top 2/3 was filled with philatelic material, with every-



thing below and to the left of the picture being numismatic supplies.

Now it is just a magnifier, a couple of overpriced grab bags and stamps, one size of hinges and one size of some mounts. That is of course only for the Murphy, Texas store; perhaps others carry more inventory? Fairly sad situation in any, at least at this particular store, and it is the only chain store that even seems to have ANY-THING philatelic related for sale (unlike the Woolworth store that I remember from 1972 in Michigan when I was a kid...). It would interesting to know how much exactly of these items they actually sell at Hobby Lobby!



#### Germany #943 Fake

This is Germany #943, issued in 1967. The design features the entry gate of the Ellwangen castle, located in the southeastern part of Germany, about halfway between Stuttgart and Nürnberg (Nuremberg in English).

I'd show a mint copy if I had one, so this very lightly cancelled copy will have to do.

Now, let's look at this --> This is a "fake" version of the stamp above. And yes, it is quite a bit bigger!

This "stamp" (sold as a "scrapbooking sticker") certainly should not fool any seasoned collector.

How many things are "wrong" here?

The overall size. 1)

The "perforations". The real stamp is 2) perforated via standard pin perforations. On the fake they must have tried to simulate undulating "die cut"

perforations, but this looks like it was done with one of those "arts & crafts" scissors!

- 3) The adhesive. The real stamp had "lick 'n stick" gum, while the fake has "self-adhesive" (pressure sensitive) gum.
- 4) The printing method. The real stamp was printed via engraving / intaglio (recessed cylinder) vs. the fake, which appears to have been printed via offset litho or possibly laser printed. See 2nd column.
- The color. It appears a bit lighter on the 5) fake.
- The design on the fake has been 6) "stretched" quite a bit. Not only wider & taller but the ratio is different. On the real stamp, the pictorial element has a ratio (width to height) of 0.975, while on the fake it is 0.836 (almost square on the real vs. rectangular on the fake).
- 7) The paper seems guite a bit thicker and smoother on the fake.

Below and at the top of column 2 you can see a 600% enlarged version of parts of the real & fake designs. On the real stamps, almost everything is continuous lines (due to



an engraved printing cylinder) while on the fakes (due to scanning of an actual stamp), the design is broken up into individual dots).

So where did I get these? The were offered on aliexpress.com, as "stamp stickers", in a quantity of 46 (2 each of 23 stickers "reproductions") for something like \$1.12 + tax.

Some of the other buildingrelated stamps are shown below.



I chose the older German stamp for this article since I actually had it in my old childhood collection. Some of the "newer" stamps do have Euro denominations (and might be "confused" as real postage) and others are in now defunct currencies, such as Lire, Deutsche Mark, French Francs, etc. I also ordered a set of a "birds & mushrooms" fakes (see bottom left).

All designs are based on real stamps (some mint, some cancelled), but adjusted dimensionally to fit one particular size.

While they are meant to be used for decorative & scrapbook projects, I'm wondering if some people do think that these are actual postage?

#### TV Philately: Golden Years

My wife and I watched the Swiss-based movie "Golden Years" a couple of days ago. It was on Amazon Prime and looked interesting and said the language was "Deutsch" (German), it's actually primarily spoken in Swiss, although there is some German, and Spanish & French spoken as well. It was nice to hear my native tongues (both German & Swiss).

The movie itself generally explores themes relating to retirement ("Golden Years") and what to do for some excitement as well as issues on what happens if the marriage is on the rocks. It is generally well acted and worth a watch if you're in retirement age.

As luck would have it, a plot point early in the movie had the main character Esther look at some old letters sent to her friend/neighbor Magalie, who died while on a walk with her and the last words wear about finding the letters and keeping them from her husband.

The screen shot above shows one of several envelopes that Esther finds. Another screen of this shows it more clearly, and they are of two French ATM stamps. I can make out a date of 2004 on the left one.



The second ATM stamp from the bottom in the first column is also from 2004 (based on the postmark on the

left stamp), but doesn't seem to be a match with the one from 2004 in my collection. Both ATM stamps really appear to be the same type. The bottom left stamp is a match for the one shown. That ATM stamp looks real enough and should be fairly common, and thus no need for the Props Dept. to create a fake one. Whether or not the postage of €0.74 was correct for a letter from France to Switzerland in 2004, I don't know. That would take some more research.

The postmark fairly difficult to read, but I can make out 2004 (the movie itself came out in 2022).

The letter is addressed to the town of "Urdorf" (with a Swiss postal code of 8902). That does match what I found on Google maps. There is even a street called "In der Gyrhalden", but the street numbers only go to 15, not 43 as on the letter.



€0.24 French ATM stamp, as well as a regular stamp that is a bit too blurry to make out (although perhaps a lengthy session with a magnifying glass and thumbing through

same



one of several "Marianne" stamps of this design issued over the years. The heart-shaped stamp (applied upside down...) is Scott #2997 (from 2004) that shows a Chanel No. 5 perfume bottle. I have neither of those 2 stamps. And I can not even make out where the stamp on the



envelope below left is from, presumably France?

In any case, the props department did a reasonably well job with these, given that they're on screen for only a few seconds!

## Been There, Done That

#### **Biplanes**

I attended the 1996 APS StampShow in Orlando, Florida from August 22 -25.

Driving there

wasn't an option, so I flew there, albeit not in a biplane as the article title might suggest...

Biplanes have been featured many times on US stamps, the most famous being the "Jenny" (aka the "Curtiss JN-4H"), which was used to carry early Airmail. The USPS issued Scott #5282 in 2018 to celebrate 100 years of US Airmail Service. A "Jenny" was actually



on display at the 2016 NY International Stamp Show.

Another popular biplane of the era (1920's - 1930's) was the Stearman, Scott #32411. issued in 1997.

While I have flown on various types of airplanes over the years (1960's to present day), and while there have been propeller or

turbo-prop planes involved, I had never actually flown in a biplane! Lucky me, as I had arrived in Orland prior to StampShow, and got to take a ride in one on August 21 (see right)! I sat in the front seat, and the pilot sat in the back. And gosh, I hoped that the leather skullcap I had to wear would adequately protect in case of a mishap (given that the pilot looked

like he flew this plane when it was new...).



Now, almost 30 years later, I wondered: "what was that plane"? There were no registration markings on either the fuselage or the tail. Uploading this image to Google, it brought forth a

lot of similar looking planes, but none that seemed to have the door in the front open sideways.

The company that ran this at the Kissimmee Air Museum shut down a few years ago (due to Florida hurricane issues) and operations moved to the American Dream Skyranch in South Carolina (which I called, but they don't do biplane rides any longer).

Since the Google search brought forth mostly Stearman and WACO planes, I pursued that. And yes, the current WACO Airplane company (originally in Troy, Ohio and now in Battle Creek, Michigan) has been building replicas of the WACO YMF-5 biplane since the 1980's. So, was mine a YMF-5, or was it a refurbished older plane, or a new replica build? I don't know, but a friend in Florida (who used to jump out of perfectly good airplanes) suggested it might be a UPF-7 (1930's - 1940's). I did find out though



that the company name is pronounced something like "Waah Coh" "a" (long sound), not Wacko or Wayco...

So in addition to refreshing my memory, I learned a bunch of new stuff during my researching this!

#### And You Thought the USPS Has Problems.. **By Peter Elias**

Below is an email (as I received it) on March 10 from Carlos in Peru (with whom I do some philatelic trading). [Please excuse some of his spelling &n grammar; English is not his native language.]

Well I have a couple of issues to share basically a month ago my letters were arriving with some delay understandable but now will be more than 02 months I don't receive anything mainly from Europe, the post office of my city at this time is exclusive for TEMU, I requested some info told me that probably all my letters are stucked in Lima due TEMU packages , bags containing letters from Lima are sent to my city twice a month due Temu excess of orders and packages have priority process so my letters are forgotten anywhere in Peru Customs I can't do anything.

The old woman was in charge selling philately at the post office of my city fractured her ankle is happy because will rest x 03 months at her home for recovering, so philately in this case modern one for me is done, I don't know for how much time, I still have a good amount of philatelic items for resell but buyers in Peru are facing economic issues as well Ebay limited my listings so is a sad situation, I don't know if your read the article appeared on the net that Danish Postal Service will not allow letters in year 2026, will be that the end of letters as well Philately? Who knows ? if that happens I will miss philately a lot. I have some other collectibles will try to sell during these days but hope some day get back to philately reseller option, I will take a look perhaps I could purchase bargain big lots from philatelic auction houses, do not know really as I mentioned before the market here is extremely limited here.

Wow! So that does paint rather a rather bleak picture of postal operations by Serpost (the Peruvian Postal Service)!

First some things in context. His city, Trujillo, is situated on the Pacific coast (as is Lima), about 345 miles northwest of Lima. Greater Trujillo has a population of 917,00, while Lima (metro area) has 11.3 million. In both cases obviously not small cities. He has told me that there is 1 post office in his city (and SmartScrapers says there are 380 post offices in all of Peru). Ft. Worth has approximately a similar population of 980,000) and according to an "AI" search, it shows 16 post offices with addresses just within the city of Ft. Worth.

But here in the USA we do not have private company, like TEMU, monopolizing the USPS to the point mail would be stuck in, for example San Antonio, that would then only be transported to Dallas once or twice a month!

Apparently there's only one Peru PO employee handling stamp sales and that's now not possible due to a medical issue?

And he's right, apparently PostNord will no longer deliver mail in Denmark starting 2026 (but there will be private companies doing this?). Iceland stopped issuing stamps in 2020. Hopefully this isn't a continuing trend...

#### Requiem for the Athletics

There are few, if any, organizations in all of sports that have as complex a history as do the Oakland Athletics. Now known simply as the Athletics, or A's for short (the "Oakland" tag was removed at the end of last season), the team is currently in the midst of a temporary move to Sacramento in anticipation of their eventual permanent move to Las Vegas as they await the completion of a new stadium to call home. I won't go into all the details regarding the A's move as there is not enough space in this article for that. But I find it tragic when a city loses a franchise it has called its own for so long. And so as the A's prepare for Opening Day in new city, let this article be a celebration of their glory years of decades past and a requiem for what once was.

The A's began their existence in 1901 as the Athletics.




USA34 one of the founding members of the American League. Beainnina in 1909 they played their home games at Shibe Park, seen on US #3518, where they would play for

the next 46 seasons. It was during their time in Philadelphia that they would host several players featured in the Legends of Baseball stamps, issued in 2000. Seen here are the hard-throwing 300-game winner Lefty Grove (US #3408k), the 1933 Triple Crown winner Jimmie Foxx (US #3408n), the 2x AL MVP Mickey Cochrane (US #3408g), and 6x World Champion Eddie Collins (US #3408b). All four of these players are considered among the best all-time at their positions, each being voted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame. And for good reason, as they contributed to a near-unprecedented run of success, capturing 7 AL Pennants and winning 5 World Series.

The A's time in Philadelphia was certainly their heyday, but despite all of the team's accomplishments on the field they were inexplicably unable to draw sustainable crowds to Shibe Park. Following the Great Depression, the A's on-field success gave way to years of cellar-dwelling and financial struggles. At the conclusion of the 1954 season, in which the A's finished in last place, the team left Philadelphia for what they expected to be greener pastures in Kansas City. What followed was 13 seasons of what can gen-

erously be described as mediocre baseball, before the team again packed up and moved on to Oakland prior to the 1968 season. And in Oakland the team returned to a degree of prominence, winning four World Series, including three in a row from 1972-74, and remaining competitive more often than not while keeping the team in perennial playoff contention. It was hard for fans to be dissatisfied with such a team, and yet there was one facet of the franchise that dogged them for years: the stadium.

The Oakland Coliseum, the A's home field since 1968, was dilapidated and crumbling, putting the team in dire need of a new ballpark. As the city of Oakland stalled such efforts, the team's ownership grew impatient and began to look elsewhere, eventually setting their eyes on Las Vegas. Around this time the A's management referred to a strategy they labeled "Parallel Paths," as they simultaneously pursued options for a new stadium with both the city of Oakland and the city of Las Vegas, likely waiting to see which would offer a better deal. Finally in









2023, after years of backroom negotiations and keeping fans in the dark, the team dropped a bomb on baseball fans everywhere: the A's would leave Oakland at the end of 2024. Their

> final game played at the Oakland Coliseum was a 3-2 victory over the Texas Rangers. With that, the Parallel Paths had at last arrived at a destination.

But this idea of "Parallel Paths" can also be used to represent the A's history in relation to the other Philadelphia baseball team that existed concurrently with A's-even sharing Shibe Park with them for a number of years-and continues to exist today: the Philadelphia Phillies. The A's and the Phillies once had parallel paths of their own, yet one team has resided in the city of its birth for its entire existence while the other has apparently been doomed to nomadism. The Phillies did not experience much success for most of their history, only winning their first of two World Series titles in 1980, by which time the A's had won 8 championships already. In fact, the A's have called more cities home than the Phillies have won World Series trophies! And yet, the trajectory of these two brother teams from the City of Brotherly Love could not be more different.

It may surprise some to know that the A's are among baseball's most historically successful teams with 9 World Series titles in their franchise's history, ranking behind only the St. Louis Cardinals (10 titles) and the New York Yankees (27 titles). The A's have seen the highest of highs-winning 15 American League Pennants and nine World Series titles-and the lowest of lows-moving more than any other team in Major League Baseball. It is bewildering to me how, despite this historic success, the once-parallel paths taken by the A's and Phillies have gone in vastly different directions.

It is a real shame when all is said and done, and while ownership continues to make decisions in favor of worshipping the almighty dollar, it is the fans who truly suffer when their hometown team relocates. It is those fans who grew up watching the team, cheering them on, dreaming of one day walking in their heroes' footsteps and building on the legacy of their hometown team. There are countless memories made every time they go to the ballpark-good times shared with friends, bonding between fathers and sons, players signing autographs for star struck vouths.

All of that gets stripped away when the team packs up and moves out of town. A chapter closes, the ballpark sits empty, and all of those good times

fade away. What's left is a sadness, an emptiness akin to losing a loved one or a close friend. Sure, another team may pop up in that location again, but it never feels the same as it did before. Older New Yorkers can attest to the truth of my words when thinking about the New York Mets, who began play in 1962, five years after both the Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants left the Big Apple for California. No team can quite replace the original, especially when the original brought so much success to its city.

One final note about the A's: the five World Series titles won during their time in Philadelphia still ranks as the most championships won by a Philadelphia sports team despite not having played in that city since 1954, over 70 years ago! So as we prepare for this season, the A's first in a new city in almost six decades, let us take a moment to remember the greatness of the team that once was and mourn the loss of the team that will never be again. It is the closing of another chapter in baseball history.

- <u>Stamp Hinges</u>: Due to members requests, the MCSC Sales Department has ordered and now has a supply of hinges available at \$3.00 per package. The hinges are the "Supersafe" brand, pre-folded, transparent, tasteless and peelable, according to the package which contains 1,000 hinges. Global Stamps, the supplier, indicated that "*There are no longer any hinges on the market that we consider to be good quality*". The problem is that the quality gummed paper that was used years ago is no longer available.
- New Sales Books: This month the sales department received 4 new sales books. Two contain used US stamps. One having modern 22, 25, 29 and 32 cent stamps. Another contains modern 33, 34, 37 and 39 cent stamps. If you are looking for US stamps of the late 1980's up to the mid 2000's this is the place to look. The 3<sup>rd</sup> book contains used stamps of Greece from #43 (1875) to #611 (1957). The 4<sup>th</sup> book contains mint UN stamps. It also includes several sheetlets from both NY and Geneva. All sales books are available to borrow and take home for examination for 1 month.
- <u>Two New Retired APS Books</u>: We also received 2 retired APS books containing stamps of Greece each for sale at \$12 for the entire book. The Scott catalog value for each is approximately \$70 to \$80.
- Special Sale on Retired OK and APS Books: The owner of these books has said "Dave, get these stamps in the hands of collectors". All retired books are now for sale at HALF the price marked on the front. Most cover prices are about 10% of catalog. I have about 100 books from many countries to sell.

We will communicate this to those preparing sales books so they can help meet your philatelic needs. A new category recently requested is Japan.






MooU (aka MSU = Michigan State University) in the Spring of



1985 (MSU is shown on Scott #1065 from 1955 above), I sometimes forget that I did actually have 2 classes at LCC (Lansing Community College)! So that definitely ties me to both philatelic items shown in this article!

And for my own self-imposed way of proving this, here's my 2 student ID cards, from MUS (above) and LCC (above right). It took me a while to find these!

My "college career" was from the Fall of 1979 to the Spring of 1985. Yes, that was more than 4 years to earn that "4-year degree" (Bachelor of Science in Packaging Engineering, which was through MSU's "College of Agriculture and Natural Resources". I do remember being sick one time and I



only offered at the same time, as well as having an internship in Germany in the Fall of 1984; that all stretched out graduation from 1983 to 1985.

So in the middle of my MSU studies, I did take Winter classes in both 1982 & 1985. I don't off-hand remember what they were though ...

After graduation in the Spring of 1985, I stuck around Lansing for the rest

of the year, and volunteered to run the "slide projector" at an International Packaging Conference held that summer. As luck would have it, I met the guy (Dr. Severus) whom I had

interviewed 2 years prior in Switzerland for a packaging term paper at MSU. And that got me my first post graduate job that had me work in Switzerland (and briefly in Germany & the UK) for most of 1986 (and has spawned many "Been There" philatelic articles 30+ years later!
