

While I wrote about the Hohentwiel back in the August 2017 edition of Stamping Around, what I did not have at the time is the strip of 4 stamps that you see to the left.

A couple of Christmases ago, my former boss (from Germany), who actually lives in the village at the base of the Hohentwiel, sent me a Christmas card with top stamp as postage). I wrote him back and asked if it was possible to get a mint version. He sent back this strip of 4! These are great!

Germany has a "custom postage" program (similar to a program we had here in the USA from 2004 until June 10, 2020). You are allowed to submit

your photos/images for printing on what is called the "Briefmarke Individuell". Unlike here in the USA, the were ordered through the German Postal Service, not private authorized companies like here in the USA, and they will mail you the completed stamps (you do have to have an address in Germany if you want to order these...). These are self-adhesive stamps (shown in actual size above).

As I have mentioned previously, I have been to the Hohentwiel several times. At least twice in 1986 (when I worked a huge aluminum converting plant located on the other side of what you see above), and also in 1999 with Annie and again in 2013 with Annie & Marcos.

The picture above was taken in 2013 by Annie, and it shows a similar view as what is on the 2nd stamp. This was the view we had when eating breakfast at a small farm / hotel in



Hilzingen. I mean who wouldn't want that view with breakfast, as we had below on the balcony of the hotel? The view above would be to the left on the picture below.

Editor's Forum

With this issue, I am starting the 22nd year of editing Stamping Around! That's mind-boggling!

Back when I started my "job" as editor with the July 2001 issue, I used Microsoft Word. I was so disgusted and frustrated with using Word for this purpose, that I had to switch to Microsoft Publisher, which was infinitely easier to use when doing a multi-column newsletter with various graphics sprinkled throughout.

The previous editor had used Adobe PageMaker, which even back then cost something \$700 or more, and something that neither the club nor I could afford. Not to mention so many features that were overkill for a publication like Stamping Around. So Microsoft Publisher was a happy middle-ground, and I am still using it. For many years I used Publisher 2003, but now that I'm on Windows 10, I upgraded to Publisher 2007 (since I had free copy of that from Microsoft).

In the past I've published some of the "statistics" regarding the newsletter (number of unique pages, total number printed pages, time spent, postage spent, etc). They are considerable numbers!

21 years ago, I actually mailed the newsletter in #10 envelopes. But that had a lot of negatives: it required mailing labels (expensive), #10 envelopes (an extra expenditure) and reduced the number of pages mailed for 1 ounce to just 8 pages (4 pieces of paper). Not to mention that there was extra labor involved (applying the labels, licking the envelopes closed and having to fold each newsletter twice rather than once). Back then, I also usually mailed 100 to 125 newsletters each month, compared to only about 13 newsletters now, so that was a considerable amount of extra time spent. Now I just fold the newsletter once, and staple it. Ta da! Out of the thousands of newsletters mailed that way, I believe there have only been a couple (like 5 or less) with processing or delivery issues!



On May 23, 2022, the USPS issued a really nice 10-stamp pane (or should it be called a souvenir sheet?) featuring the "Mighty Mississippi" and the various scenery along its' banks on the 10 states that border it.

Over the years, I have been to these 10 states (and even lived in one of them - Kentucky), but based purely on the stamp designs shown, have I only been exactly to one spot depicted on them, and that is St. Louis, which features the iconic "Arch". Of the other states, most I've been to for various personal or business reasons, and only lowa comes to mind as a state that I've simply driven through (back in 1980 when our parents took a big 10,000 mile trip "out west" from Michigan).

I have been to the top of the Gateway Arch several times. The first time was in early 1986, when I was temporarily stationed in St. Louis for about a month prior to going to my assignment in Switzerland for the rest of that year. I was also in St. Louis sometime in the late 1980's, when I lived in Kentucky. The most recent trip to St. Louis was in August 2015, while we were on a driving vacation to Michigan and back. The picture of me (at top right) on top of the 630 foot Arch was taken during that trip. St. Louis is a great city to visit.

I was pleasantly surprised that the Plano post office actually managed to have these stamps available on the first day of issue! And that they hard actually ordered a whole "pad" of 100 panes. Luckily I was able to get that deck card and used the Missouri stamp on it and had it postmarked.

The scan to the right shows the deck card, but because of the huge green border, I cropped that a bit.

I could have used the Louisiana stamp on the deck card, since that would match the illustration on the deck card, however, I chose the Missouri stamp as that is the one that more in line with this article.

So, which of these stamps relate to you, the reader? Come on, write about it, send a photo. No need to buy the stamps, as I already haven them (unless of course you need one for your personal "Been There" collection...!



Former MCSC Member Donation to UTA

The University of Texas at Arlington has received more than \$1.5 million in support of scholarships for talented and deserving students.

Alumnus Edward Perez Jr.'s gift will create two endowed scholarships—one for students in the College of Nursing and Health Innovation and another for students in the College of Science. Both scholarships will be named the Edward and Dorothy Perez Scholarship Fund in honor of Perez and his late wife, Dorothy. The funds were granted posthumously through a bequest that named UTA as the sole beneficiary of Perez's IRA account at the time of his passing in 2018.

Our club budget is such that we can offer this to our members and we hope that we'll see some of you create exhibits for the first time to get an idea of how to display your collecting interests to others.





Puerto Rico

Back in July 2021, Pat and I decided to take a trip to Puerto Rico. We stayed at the Sheraton in Old San Juan, which is down by the bay. One day we decided to walk down along the shore where we saw the large "I Love PR" sign. I took a picture of Pat standing next to it, which is shown below.



Puerto Rico, which translates to "Rich Port" is an island in the Caribbean, 1,000 miles southeast of Florida. Our direct flight from DFW took five hours. Puerto Rico was discovered by Christopher Columbus on his second voyage to the new world in 1493. He claimed it for Spain and name it *San Juan Batista*, which translates to "St. John the Baptist" in Spanish. It remained a Spanish possession until 1898, when it was turned over to the United State during the Spanish-American War.

In 1952, Puerto Rico became a Commonwealth. On more than one occasion, it was put to a vote of the Puerto Rican people if they wanted independence, statehood, or to continue as a Commonwealth. They chose to continue as a Commonwealth.

Longest Cave

More than 365 miles
of passages have been
explored and mapped in
Mammoth Cave, in
Kentucky. This is the
longest known cave
in the world; according
to tradition, it was
discovered in the 1790s
by a hunter chasing a bear. In 1987, after my year of working in Switzerland, I found myself living and working in the State of Kentucky.


Given that I like to visit caves (even Switzerland had a couple that I visited), I figured that I would check out the "Mammoth Caverns", since

they weren't too far a drive from where I lived.

The Mammoth Cave is a US National Park, and has its own post office - although I didn't know that at the time). The Mammoth Caves are featured on Scott #4068, as part of a sheet of 50 stamps featuring "Superlatives" (longest, tallest, etc) issued on May 27, 2006.

Rummaging around my old photo albums, I actually found the entry ticket from April 25, 1987 (see right) along with a couple of photos that I took (below). No pictures of me though, as back







then all I had was a bulky 35mm camera, no tripod with me and I was travelling by myself that day.

Mammoth Cave is the world's longest known cave system, with

more than 420 explored miles of passageways.

At the National Park Service website (see https://www.nps.gov/maca/index.htm), there are over 20 different "tours" listed, based on my ticket stub from 1987, the current "Frozen Niagara" tour would cost \$18 (unless you're a "senior").

The "Grand Central Station" sign shown above is fairly close to the beginning of the Frozen Niagara tour. For further reading, here's a link to a 1960's brochure:

Am I In The Wrong Business?

Some of you may be familiar with Etsy, an online marketplace that caters mostly to crafts. I normally haven't gone there much, since "crafts" aren't a big area of interest to me. However, when I typed in "stamps" in their search box, up come a LOT of ads for mint USA stamps, such as this one:



Or this one:



All I can say is WOW! The price for that Texas State Bird & Flower stamp is for ONE stamp (plus \$4.48 to ship according to Etsy). For the Clown stamp, the price is for an entire sheet (+\$4.48 shipping).

Given that pretty much all older USA mint stamps (say 1950's to early 2000's) can be bought for a fraction of face value, then this is certainly a good moneymaker for the Etsy seller (both of the above stamps are from the same seller, which has a solid 5-star rating).

Now, the above said, I'd say that none of the buyers are going to be stamp collectors, but people that want to adorn their mail or craft pieces with "vintage" USA stamps! I'm sure that most non-collectors don't know that they could buy all of these types of stamps at face (or well below) at their nearest stamp dealer bourse or stamp show (but of course, a lot of people may not live anywhere near a stamp show or bourse...).

As a collector (and eBay seller of philatelic items), I do kind of cringe a bit when I see prices like this, and would find it personally difficult to put prices like these on items such as these, as I would feel that I'm ripping off the buyer!

But as they say, "Caveat Emptor" ("Let the buyer beware"). If there is a willing seller and a willing buyer, then there's nothing wrong or illegal about that.

But also remember that Etsy, just like other online marketplace platforms (think eBay, Amazon, HipStamp, Delcampe and others) charge a variety of fees. Etsy does charge a "listing fee", "ad fees", "subscription fees", "payment processing fees", "off-site ad fees", etc. Read up on these closely before signing up!


USPS Service Suspensions

As stamp collectors, we often send mail to other countries. Given the recent pandemic, there are various countries that have suspended mail services altogether, or even if they haven't, the USPS might not accept mail to be sent to these countries.

So given the screen shot above (from June 10), if you were to click on Ukraine, you'd get the following information:

3-8-22

Global Express Guarantee (GXG®) Service Suspension The Postal Service $^{\text{TM}}$ has temporarily suspended international mail acceptance of Global Express Guarantee (GXG) to Ukraine.

3-2-22

Ukraine Post advises that some post offices across various regions will continue to be open on a limited basis so customers can receive mail and parcels. The post also advises countries to send their international postal items to Ukraine via Poland, Slovakia or Latvia. The post will be collecting the consignments from those countries.

2-24-22

Ukraine Post advises that due to the conflict in the region international postal transit through Ukrainian territory has been suspended until further notice. Post offices will remain closed beginning Feb. 24 and postal deliveries are suspended until further notice. As soon as the situation allows, the post will resume delivery of all international postal items.

If you were to click on the button labeled "View The Suspensions", you'd get a list up of all countries to where mail (1st class, priority, express, etc) is completely suspended); that list as of 6/10/2022 includes:



Informed Delivery, But Damaged


Every day (Monday through Saturday) I get an "Informed Delivery" email from the USPS (unless there's no mail for me that day). It shows up to 10 pieces of mail that I should receive that day.

On June 13, I received an email that you see below, slightly cropped, as I received 6 pieces of mail that day at my PO Box, of which the item shown was actually the 3rd item, and which is the one of interest for this article.



So above you can see (at an angle, which is unusual), one of the envelopes I was to receive that day, and unfortunately, someone else's mail piece is shown behind mine. But you can tell that the envelope address to me is intact.

What I got is what you see here:



The envelope as I found it in my PO Box was missing the right third of it! Additionally, that right edge was partially (a millimeter or two) sticking out at the bottom gap of my PO Box door (an even width across).

I took it to a USPS clerk and he said that it was torn during processing (luckily the only thing in the envelope was a folded #10 SASE, which was situated in the middle third of the envelope and thus not affected).

I also noticed that on the lower left side, is one of those small "elliptical" chunks missing out of the envelope. I see these fairly often, but they're always at the bottom of envelopes. These must occur when some rotating transport wheel in the mail processing equipments literally grinds an elliptical semi-circle in the envelope. Since this is on the left, perhaps the envelope faced upwards (and subsequently torn)?

Or, my theory has it that this envelope was sticking out even further from my mailbox door originally, and that someone had tried to pull it all the way out, and in the process of wiggling it through the gap of the door managed to tear it (it is a fairly clean tear)? Remember that the SASE adds thickness, and the envelope probably couldn't go further through the mailbox door and tore. Was this an attempted mail theft? Was someone that desperate for the "Duke Kahanamoku" commemorative stamp that was on this envelope or "something inside"?

Why Bother?

Generally, when I mail letters to my relative in Germany, I take the envelope to the counter at my post office and they let ME hand cancel the envelope. This last time, on May 17, the lines at the post office were at least 20+ minutes long, and I didn't feel standing in line that long just to hand cancel the envelope, so I simply dropped it into the mail slot.


Generally I would expect a standard #10 envelope to get an inkjet spray-on cancel, but no, this was the

result:



My relative always clips the stamps off my envelopes and sends them back to me, but I'm not even going to bother with soaking off the 13¢ stamp in this case. I mean, one single strike covering both stamps near the bottom of the stamps would have sufficed...

TV Philately: The Woman Who Wasn't There By Peter Elias



Last year I watched a program on Amazon Prime called "The Woman Who Wasn't There", a documentary about "Tania Head", who claimed to have been present during the 9/11 attacks on the World Trade Center and who gained a lot of notoriety by being a spokesperson for the survivors by inserting herself into leadership positions in various support organizations.

Comic Strip - Pluggers (Forever Stamps)

Pluggers aren't concerned when the cost of stamps goes up. They bought a lifetime supply of forever stamps 15 years ago.

This "Pluggers" comic strip was published in the May 26, 2022 issue of the Dallas Morning News.

According to the Scott catalog, beginning with catalog #4125 (the "Liberty Bell" definitive issue), was the first "FOREVER" stamp issued by the USA in 2007, on April 12. Rick McKee's statement of 15 years ago is correct. However, not all 1st Class stamps in 2007 after that point were FOREVER stamps, just some of the definitives. All commemorative stamps in 2007 were still labeled "41¢", as were all 42¢ and most 44¢ commemoratives (although some 44¢ of the "Flags of our Nation" series - along with all later 45¢ versions - were marked with "FOREVER").

When the (44¢) Holiday "Pine Cone" stamps were issued in October 21, 2010, these were labeled "FOREVER", and all 44¢ commemoratives from that point forward (2011) were FOREVER stamps, with the exception of the flag-themed inkwell definitive #4496 on February 14, 2011, which was still labeled as 44¢.

So, let's say you bought a "lifetime supply" (whatever that is for you) of #4125 in April 2007. Would that have been worth it as of May 2022? With postage presently 58¢ (and 60¢ starting on July 10), that is a 41% increase in 15 years. According to online inflation calculators, a dollar in 2007 would have a purchasing power of \$1.39 today, so a 39% increase. I'd say it's par for the course... so for now; you're not really ahead by much, except maybe a smidgen, when the rates go up to 60¢ (then it would be a 46% increase). Unless postage rates go up phenomenally soon, I'd say that "investing" in FOREVER stamps is not a good long term investment strategy ...

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

I did find a copy of the Comic Strip Classics sheet in my US collection and it is shown at top right in reduced scale.


I have no beefs about anything in this particular comic strip and I am glad to see that Mort Walker was
