ordered 15 more Jenny sheets, and figured why not buy a couple (21!) sheets of the new 1, 2, 3, 5, & 10¢ flower definitives (in case I get tired of licking the older stamps).

S o

All of these items came packed with a piece of cardboard and surrounded by a sealed clear plastic sleeve, as shown above. There is no printing on the plastic except some minor information on the back.

I'm one to try and 1) reuse an item; 2) recycle if possible and, 3) dispose if neither 1 & 2 will work. That said. between the Jennies & definitives, I ended up with 36 pieces of gray cardboard (see below) that I can at least re-use as stiffeners in my own outgoing mail. Then there were the 15




white index card sized stiffeners inside the 15 envelopes for the Jennies.

The pile of all stamp sheetlets was about 1/4" thick, while the stack of all their packaging materials was about 8 times as thick!

I can also use the white Jenny sheet envelope inserts as stiffeners in my own #6 envelopes. The Jenny envelopes? Recycle?

But then there is the other issue: all of the plastic sleeves/ wrappers. These 36



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German Briefmarkensprache Confusion

↑Remember this card? I wrote about the **Briefmarken Sprache** (Stamp Language) on this German postcard in the March issue. But as they say, "but wait, there's more!": I just found this Swiss **Briefmarkensprache** postcard to the right (note how they make that into one word).

Now, one of the four national languages of Switzerland is German (although they actually speak "Schwyzerdütsch"; which by itself can be spelled in different ways...), another is French. Both German & French languages are shown on their card. I'll only concentrate on the German part.

While the general purpose of these cards is the same, that is, to show how the position of a stamp on a postcard or letter can "mean" different things (generally sentiments related to relationships), there is certainly a big difference between these cards, despite both having the sentiments expressed in German.

The German card has 10 stamps & sentiments shown, while the Swiss card has 11.

And there are big differences are in how the sentiment correlates with the positioning (angle) of the stamp.

slightly different angles).

But the only other two similar sentiments German & Swiss #8 ("don't" or "never" forget me) have totally different facing stamps (left for German, vertical for Swiss).

So what happens if a German sent a card or letter to someone in Switzerland? They'd be interpreted differently! I'm sure that they had similar postcards in France, so would someone's stamp orientation on a French postcard sent to a French-speaking Swiss person be taken differently? Most likely yes.

I thought I saw another similar postcard (Danish perhaps?) in my collection at some point, but can't find it at the moment; but I'm sure that the "stamp language" is different on that one as well!

This could certainly make an interesting exhibit (and analysis) if one could put together a collection of these type of postcards from various countries.

Of course these days, no one does this anymore, except

GERMAN sentiments:

- 1) Ewig Dein. [Yours always.]
- 2) Ich erwarte Dich. [I awaiting you.]
- 3) Ich habe grosse Sehnsucht. [I have great desire.]

- 5) Du must mich lieben! [You must love me!]
- 6) Denkst Du an mich? [Are you thinking of me?]
- 7) Ich denk an Dich! [I am thinking of you!]
- 8) Vergiss mich nicht! [Don't forget me!]
- 9) Ich wünsche Ihre Freundschaft! [*I am wishing for your friendship*]
- 10) Ich komme! [I am coming!]
- 11) Liebst Du mich? [Do you love me?]

Of all these sentiments, none are shared exactly between the German & Swiss cards, the closest is German #5 and Swiss #3, where the difference is between being loyal versus remaining loyal and #8 for both cards, which are "never" vs. "don't" forget me.

Unless it is a question, most German sentiments seem to end in a period, while all the Swiss ones end in an exclamation point!

Then there is the matter of the stamp orientation / angle. Similar facing stamps, say German #8 (*Never forget me*) & Swiss #1 (*Awaiting a response*), which both face left, mean totally different things!

Only the somewhat similar German #5 (I am loyal to you) and


Square Will Cost You

If you've ever read up on some of the USPS regulations regarding 1st class mail, one of them deals with envelope sizes & ratios that will help determine the postage rate, in addition to the weight.

ing with blue lines, which shows the upper right hand corner in the white area, thus requiring a non-machinable fee, which wasn't paid, and thus added on as "Postage Due" when it arrived, as per the USPS Notice123 in effect at the time.

This envelope also shows WHY they have a non-machinable fee, as the facing equipment didn't know how to



To help USPS clerks with this, they have a template that they use to make sure that 1st class letters are within the rules, which include weight, size & shape.

If you look at the template above (reduced to fit this page), you can see various information about minimum & maximum sizes for postcard and 1st class letter mail.

The upper right section with the gray shaded area is to help determine whether your envelope for 1st class mail meets general "standard sizes". If the envelope is placed against the lower left corner, take note of whether the upper right corner. If it ends up in the gray zone, you're ok. If the envelope is past the minimum length & width, less than maximum length & width AND the upper right corner falls into the white areas, then you'll be assessed an extra fee, known as the "non-machinable" fee, which is presently 46¢ in addition to the postage (and remember, 1st class mail is only available up to 3.5 oz [100 grams] in weight to begin with.

Additionally, your envelope must also be able to slide through the rectangular slot (shown as the big black bar), meaning it can NOT be thicker than ¼" (otherwise it would have to go as "Ground Advantage"). If your envelope is too "stiff", that would also gather the non-machinable fee.

The envelope at right is square (6" x 6"), and if placed against the template, would be in the area I'm show-

correctly face the envelope, turning it sideways and applying the inkjet cancel on what is the left side, leaving the stamp uncancelled. Unfortunately at the receiving end, out came the ballpoint pen across the stamp (grrrr...).



USA Single Digit Postage Usage Limitations

A while back, it was much easier to use up older "single digit" US stamps for postage, i.e.: the $1 \c c$ to $9 \c c$ denominated ones.

Now, if you are trying to mail a #6 envelope with any of these (especially 5¢ or lower denominations), that's physically impossible due to the size of the envelope). Even with a #10 envelope, it would be difficult, unless you are using definitive stamps.

In my case, I managed to get 14x 5¢ stamps + a 3¢ stamp, all commemoratives on a 6" x 9" envelope (see to the right) and leave enough room for the address and space for the Postnet code at the bottom. But if I would

have tried just 4¢ stamps, I would have run out of space.

So I decided to mock up a #10 business size envelope with a couple of combinations of US stamp sizes, which included a standard vertical definitive, and vertical & horizontal standard size commemoratives, to see how many stamps I could reasonably put on an envelope and still leave enough room for sender & recipient addresses and the USPS Postnet code which would be applied during processing.

On envelope #1, I was able to fit 13x horizontal commemoratives and 2x definitives. Using just 3ϕ stamps, you'd be short 30ϕ . Even with all 4ϕ stamps, you'd still need another 13ϕ worth. A combination of 5ϕ & 6ϕ stamps might do the trick.

On envelope #2, I was able to fit 12x vertical commemoratives plus 2x definitives. As with #1, all 3¢ & 4¢ stamps won't work, it'll have to be at least 5¢ & some 6¢ stamps.


On envelope #3, I was able to fit 25x standard definitives. That would work with all 3¢ definitives, but there aren't that many of those available.


There could also be an option for the vertical medium size commemoratives such as the "Champion of Liberties" series of 4¢ & 8¢ stamps.


Many combinations are possible with #10 envelopes, but using all 3¢ & 4¢ stamps isn't going to work...



Niue Map Inconsistencies

Above is Niue Scott #94, issued in 1950. It depicts a map of the island. Niue (sort of pronounced "Nee-You", is a self-governing island in free association with New Zealand (which is a whopping 1,500 miles southwest of Niue). Even other islands in the Pacific, such as Samoa, Tonga and the Cook islands are many hundreds of miles away.

Niue is fairly small island, about 100.95 square miles (roughly the same as Arlington, TX at 99.69 square miles). A 2022 Census showed 1,681 people and the per-capita income is \$5,800 per year (data from https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Niue).

While I don't collect Niue as such, I do have a liking for maps, so I figured, why not take a closer look at this one! To do that required some help from Google maps; it shows for example, that the southern-most village on the stamp, "Fatiau" is not

When Google Maps couldn't help with the next task, I used Google Earth in order to actually see Latitude & Longitude lines on the map, which is what you see below. Sizing the map on the stamp & Google Earth image so that they are equal (see black lines going across stamp & map), it clearly shows that the 19°S latitude line on the stamp's map is WAY off from what Google Earth shows, which I presume to be more accurate.

on the current Google map (see cropped screenshot below the

stamp)! It shows absolutely nothing, not even the southern most

road that branches off at Avatele, going to Fatiau, only the one

On the stamp, the 19°S line is (approximately 1 mile) south of Makefu or Lakepa, yet on Google Earth it is shown as being (approximately 1/3 mile) north of Lakepa, so that is quite a bit of discrepancy. I wonder if the stamp designer had good maps at their disposal (perhaps that was the best available in 1950)? According to Google Earth, the hamlet of Lakepa ranges from 19°0'25" to 19°0'40" south latitude, a distance of about 300 meters (about 984 feet).

On the other hand, the 169°50' West Longitude does seem to be depicted fairly accurately on the stamp compared to the Google Earth view!

I found this little exercise to be very educational!

Perusing through my Scott stamp catalog, I found this stamp, Switzerland #B242 issued in 1955 for the 100th Anniversary of the ETH (Eidgenössische Technische Hochschule = Swiss Federal Institute of Technology) in Zürich. This is the lowest value of that year's

"Pro Patria" (for one's country) semi-postal stamp issue (the others feature scenery). Since I didn't have this stamp, I bought one from eBay.

But why? Because that's where my father worked (from 1960 to mid-1971 (when we moved to the USA).

Now, did he ever take me to work? I don't have any recollections of that in particular (I would have been maybe 7 - 10 years old at that time). Although I do have a vague memory though of having visited him briefly in his office and/or labs at the ETH at least once. There are no photos of that. I did, however, find a photo of him at work (along with 2 colleagues; guess which one is my dad):



According to his note on the back of the photocard, it was taken in the Spring of 1962 (I was a bit less than 2 years old then!). I have no photo credit for this, other than the rubber stamp on the back of the photo (which was printed in postcard format) from a company called "foto zumbrunn" that did promo & model photos. Researching that a bit further, I found at https://fotozumbrunn.ch/biography/ that Michael Zumbrunn opened up a photo studio in Zürich in 1961 as a commercial photographer (& also editorials for women's fashion magazines). So, I'd say it's safe to attribute the photo credit to Michael Zumbrunn. His company is now known for classic car photography and is based out of the city of Aarau. I just wanted to be correct about any photo attribution...

Unlike here in the USA, dad did not drive to work (we didn't own a car until early 1971, and that only because we were moving to the USA); he had to take public transportation (even my visit required I take the bus & tram).

After leaving our apartment and walking around 800 feet or so, he would have to take a bus (electric of course), similar to the one shown below. Then perhaps 15 minutes later, he would have to switch to a tram, such as the one shown



The ETH was then located along the tramline, not too far from the Zürich Hauptbahnhof (the main

train station).

I looked up the routing for this trip, and according to the Google Map, it's about a 5.1 km (3.2 mile) distance, and the bus & tram trip is about a 27 minute ride.

I do remember that he did on oc-

casion come home for lunch (as we also did from school). Lunch "hour" in Switzerland was 2 hours long, so there was certainly enough time to do that.

During his tenure at <u>ETH</u>, he supervised <u>32 doctoral</u> <u>candidates</u> from Switzerland, Germany, Egypt, et al.

Extreme Philately: Tulsa

This article serves as a "Part 2" to my Extreme Philately article from last month. During our road trip through Oklahoma, my wife and I stopped in Oklahoma City to see the Centennial Land Run monument (which was featured in last month's article), then made a quick pass through Stillwater for coffee with a priest friend, before arriving in Tulsa to visit friends for a couple of days. And it was in Tulsa where I was able to once again do some Extreme Philately. Allow me to direct your attention to US #1134.



This 4¢ stamp, issued on August 27, 1959 honors the centennial of the American petroleum industry. More specifically, it depicts the Drake well which struck oil near Titusville, PA on August 27, 1859. For those of you who, like me, had never heard of the Drake well, upon striking oil it became the first commercially viable oil well in the United States and kicked off the American oil industry.

While the Drake well eventually stopped producing and sat abandoned, a small museum was built on the site in 1934 to preserve this bit of history. However, the Drake well itself was dismantled some time before 1900 (I could not find a precise date, it seems that it was never recorded), so a visitor to the museum will find themselves unable to take a picture of the famous well. They will instead need to settle for a replica.

While Tulsa is not anywhere close to Pennsylvania, I figured I ought to still be able to find something oil-related to fit with this stamp. After all, Tulsa is known for the petroleum industry. Oil is to Tulsa what cattle is to Fort Worth. They have a minor league baseball team called the Tulsa Drillers. They even have a 75-foot tall statue of the Golden Driller standing in front of the Tulsa Expo Center! So yes, oil is big in Tulsa.

And indeed I did not need to look hard to find a suitable match. Across the river from downtown Tulsa sits the Route 66 Historical Village, a small museum that celebrates Tulsa's connection to that famous highway. In addition to Route 66-themed road signs, a few vintage cars, and a historic steam

locomotive with railcars, the museum also just so happens to include an oil derrick just like the one depicted on US #1134.

Been There, Done That

NYC Subway

Back in the October 2023 issue, I wrote about taking the "Tube" in London to get around, which was probably the 2nd time (2000) in my life that I've taken a subway.

The 3rd time, was the New York City subway. That occurred in 2016, when I was there for the NY2016 International Stamp Exhibition for a week. To get to & from the venue from my hotel in New Jersey, I took a bus (only about 15-20 minute ride) and then walked a mile to the Jacob Javits Convention Center.

So my transportation needs were basically met

easily; I was only in 2 places, my hotel room and the show.

One evening though, being a member of the British Caribbean Philatelic Study Group, they had a dinner gettogether, and it was held at a Chinese Restaurant elsewhere in NYC. To get there, I shared an Uber with a couple of other members, however, after the dinner (and I must say, the Peking Duck was delicious!), I had to get back to the bus transit station on my own. So I figured, why not take the subway?

Well, I certainly did not (or should I have?) expect to see people sleeping IN cardboard boxes aboard the train!





The only stamp I could find that shows a NYC subway, was St. Vincent #3436, issued in 2004, that commemorates the system's 100-year anniversary. The A-train shown on the stamp is the longest one in the system at a little over 32 miles (out of a total of 248 miles, 36 lines, 472 stations and over 2 million annual ridership).

So, this covers my subway experiences #2 & #3. I'll write about #1 later (it occurred in 1991). FYI: Dallas' DART has a 3¼ mile subway section and a subway station!



Club Sales Book Update August 1, 2024

The club sales book department just paid members \$626.65 for sales from their MCSC sales books. Last year we paid members almost \$1,000 for sales from their books.

Did this get your attention? Do you want to get in on reaping the benefits from the sale of duplicate or unwanted philatelic materials? One way is to buy a club sales book for 50¢ each and put your stamps and other materials in the book so that others can see what you have and maybe buy it.

Since January 2024, 9 new sales books have been added. These books contain materials with a total price of just under \$1,000. The prices listed for materials ranges from 8% to 30% of Scott catalog prices. Most materials sell well when they are priced at no more than 25% of catalog.

The club now has 46 sales books in circulation. These books contain materials priced at \$2,770 with a catalog value of over \$10,000.

Materials that have recently sold well are classic US stamps, as well as stamps from Switzerland, Great Britain, Denmark, Finland and topicals along with old envelopes.

If you have unwanted or unneeded philatelic materials (stamp & envelopes), this may be a way to show it and give others a chance to find treasures they want or need.

Stop by the "Sales Department" at any of our 3 meeting locations and see what we have. If you want to take club books home to look at in more detail you are welcome to sign them out as long as you return them next month.
