Food For Thought

It was 33 years ago when I joined the Mid-Cities Stamp Club, and thus I've been a member of the club a bit over half of my life now!

Now that I see that age is creeping up on me, I figured I'd do a quick analysis of the ages of our current 93 members (obtained via various "people finder" databases online).

The results are to the right, organized in age group by age decade. Back in 1992, I would have been in the 2nd column (30-39), now I'm 3 columns further to the right.

This graph should speak for itself. 90% of our members are 60 to 89 years old, with age group 70-79 being 39% of all members. And as that group transitions to the 80-89 age, there usually aren't too many people in the 90+ group (1 member presently). Eventually we all "age out" for a variety of reasons (such


as sight, ability to drive at night, dementia, having to move to an assisted living facility, etc), a sad fact of life.

At present, there are only 7 members that make up the 4 age groups up to age 59. We only have 1 member below 30. Sadly kids (even my own son) don't seem to have much of an interest in stamps, perhaps because the hobby isn't presented to them in a way that is meaningful to them, so unless that changes, kids are not the answer for the future of clubs nor the hobby. I'm sure we can blame "screens" for some of that, social media, or just collecting other stuff (Pokémon™ cards, Legos™, etc). The only youth member we had last year isn't renewing this year. Even at last year's show, there was not much (any?) "youth" activity at the beginning collectors table.

I believe that the "middle years" (say, 40 - 65) is what we've got to try and attract to the hobby. Otherwise, how will the demographics look 10 years from now? I'll be in the 70 - 79 group then. How many of the current 80 - 89 members will still be active when they are 90+? Especially the left 2 columns of the chart do not look so good; the right one is as expected.

We (i.e.: collectively the "hobby") tend to "preach to the choir" a lot, meaning marketing within the hobby and I don't see a lot of outreach to the "general public", other than perhaps some social media, and while that is good, it does not necessarily translate into paid members of a club (the internet is "free", right?). I don't necessarily have the answers as such. Whenever I can though, I do mention collecting to other people, the various interesting topics that are out there to collect, the people I've met and even the places that I've been to BECAUSE of philately!

Personally, I think that the topical or thematic approach to stamp collecting one of the is best ways to get started. Sure, collect a "country"; that's is great if you want to explore your roots a bit that way. And certainly there is nothing wrong with collecting US stamps. But many people also have "something"



that is meaningful in their life (whether that be another hobby, their career, perhaps they're "birders", etc); and whatever THAT is, you can usually apply stamp collecting to it! Every little bit helps!



The Cover Story

My favorite thing to do at a TSDA (Texas Stamp Dealers Association) show is to go through the dealers' dollar cover boxes to try to find my own little treasures buried in the piles of envelopes. Sometimes my search is fruitful, sometimes not, but the fun is in the hunt. The most recent show was held on April 4th & 5th did not disappoint me at all. So, here are some of my treasures obtained for about a dollar each.



The above cover, a post card, was mailed on December 20, 1949, from Los Alamos, New Mexico to Holdenville, Oklahoma.

The interesting thing about this one is that there is a Christmas Seal cancelled by the postmark. Many times, Christmas seals were used on cards or envelopes in the place of stamps and were sent through the mail by mistake, prompting the Post Office Department to require that Christmas seals be affixed to the reverse side rather than the addressed side. This sometimes was forgotten or just ignored as indicated by this usage.



Next is a cover mailed from Poetry, Texas to Austin, Texas on January 9, 1895.

The post office at Poetry was only in operation from January 1880 to January 1905, so it is now considered a "Dead or Discontinued" post office (DPO). Letters from dead post offices have different values

depending on how long the post office was in operation. The shorter the time the post office was in operation, the more rare the postmark. Of course, the smaller post offices with fewer customers also contribute to the rarity of the postmark.



This cover I haven't quite figured out. It was mailed from Macon, Georgia on September 7, 1901 to Detroit, Michigan, arriving two days later.

What is interesting about this cover are the two -2ϕ stamps that were used for postage. The only reason for this that I can think of, is that the postal clerk cancelled the cover with one stamp on it, and then put it on a scale and determined it was overweight, and then added a second stamp to it, cancelling it as well. The postal rate for standard envelopes was 2 cents per ounce in 1901, so that seems to be the logical explanation. It is just interesting that it has two separate stamps applied with two separate cancels.



Finally, my best find of the day, was this ratty-looking "front only" cover with a special delivery stamp and half of a regular postage stamp on it.

"Front only" means this is not a complete envelope but just the part the stamps were attached to. The rest of the envelope has been torn away. The real value here is the E4 Special Delivery stamp which catalogs at about \$110 used or \$300 on cover.

Keep on treasure hunting! See you at the next meeting.

Fancy Cancel

hand.

Digging through a pile of stamps, I found this copy of USA #210. While not a great example of good centering, what caught my eye was the cancel.

So while I know of "fancy cancels" from the late 1800's, and have seen a few here and there, this one just baffles me. Just what exactly am I looking at? At first, I thought, maybe a bird sitting on a

tree branch. The circular shape at top plus what might be a beak to the right, plus perhaps tail feathers below the branch. But then the end of the "branch" (right side), it looks like a LEGO® Minifigure

I tried subtracting out that red brown color, but even that didn't help me much. The Scott USA Specialized catalog doesn't really show any examples of fancy cancels, probably a very involved subject. Let me know what thoughts ya'll have about this one!

and writer named Yone Noguchi, whom she met in New York. She was the mother of a son, whom she called "Yo" at first. When Yone declared that he was going back to Japan when the Russo-Japanese War broke out, he left for Japan.

Leonie then briefly moved to California with her son and lived with her mother in a tent. Acceptance of her Japanese son wasn't great due to racism, so she took up Yone's invitation to bring his son to Japan.

Yone was a bit "cold" though upon her arrival and names his son "Isamu" and she lived separately from him got a job as an English teacher. She later gives birth to a daughter (by one of her student's fathers).

In the scene shown to the left, roughly around 1908 or 1910, when she is still in Japan, she receives a letter that her mother (in California) had passed away.

While the paused screen shot is very clear, the stamps on the envelope make up on a very tiny part of the screen. Magnifying that, makes it look a bit fuzzy as you can tell.

I'm sure that the props department conjured up something to make it look like a mailed letter. The return address was that of a "Catherine Burnell" (whom she had met at the Bryn Mawr college in 1892) and who is now living in New York.

The postmark is illegible but meant to mimic a standard "wavy line" machine cancel. The two US definitives, I can't identify from this.

The son, <u>Isamu Noguchi</u>, became a famous American artist, furniture designer (with the Hermann Miller company) and landscape architect

from the 1920's to 1988. There's more info at Wikipedia; click the 3 blue underlined links in this article for more information than I have room for in this article.

So as always, a cover shown on screen looks plausible since it is only up for a second or two, but generally "no cigar" when analyzing it.

USPS Delivery SNAFU

Since this newsletter from time to time recounts adventures with the US Postal Service, readers may be interested in a recent experience I had. I live in Plano and bought an item on eBay without realizing the seller also lives in Plano.

After six weeks the item had not arrived and I reported it lost or stolen. A week later the packet showed up in my post office box.

In communication with the seller he indicated he mailed it at the Coit Road post office (northeast corner of Coit Rd & Parker Rd). My P.O. box is at the Wildcat Station, just a bit further east on Parker Road. It took seven weeks for a flat envelope to be delivered approximately 2 miles!

Been There, Done That

The "C" Island


From March 9 - 14, 1998, I found myself on one of the "ABC" islands, specifically the "C" one. "ABC" is the abbreviation given to the 3 main islands that make up the Netherlands Antilles (shown is Scott #244,

issued in 1959) and highlights the "C" island (Curaçao). "A" would be Aruba and "B" is "Bonaire".

Looking at a map of the ABC islands, they should technically be called the ACB islands, if you look at them from left to right (west to east). This is about as close to South America as I have been (as of 1998); the Venezuelan coast is only about 40 miles south of Curaçao. However, in 1999, I was only about 5 to 10 miles away from Venezuela, as I was in Trinidad.

So what brought me to Curaçao? In early 1998, since it was very close to the computer "doomsday" of "Y2K" (Year 2000), after which some older software would not work right (due to not knowing whether the software thinks it is "19<u>00</u>" or "20<u>00</u>" and the world would stop spinning ... so we were gearing up to install updates to the software that we were selling, as it had originally been programmed (back in the early 1980's) with only 2, not 4 digits for the year.

The stamp at top shows the facades of some of the buildings on the east side of the channel that leads to the inner harbor in Willemstad, the capital of Curação.



The photo above and to the right shows the same buildings, just from different angles. Below is a picture of the channel showing a cruise ship leaving and the big blue building is where I had dinner with Sallian, who had asked me to help me with the manufacturing side of the software upgrade (while she did the accounting side). I even got to visit the local postal museum while there (I try to sneak in some philately on my trips)!

The next year, 1999, had me doing upgrades in Canada, Trinidad & Jamaica. Y2K sure kept me very busy!



Nixed On Route 66

Every year for Thanksgiving, my wife and I travel to Chicago to spend the holiday with my parents. Traditionally in lieu of shopping on Black Friday, my family would always spend the day together and go on a family outing to one of the many world-famous museums in and around the city. And there are plenty to choose from, the Field Museum, the Museum of Science and Industry, the Art Institute of Chicago, the Shedd Aguarium, and the Adler Planetarium, among others.

In keeping with that tradition, my wife and I headed downtown on Black Friday, braving the 2°F windchill with our not-yet 2-year-old daughter in tow, and headed toward the Art Institute. Along the way I managed to get a few "Extreme Philately" photos that will find a use

As we approached the Art Institute, I noticed something across the street from the museum that I had never noticed before: the origin point of US Route 66, seen in this photo. Above the origin point, at the northeast corner of the intersection of Adams St. and Michigan Ave. hangs a sign on the light post that reads: "BEGIN HISTORIC ILLINOIS US 66 ROUTE," seen here.



block down the street, below the Adams/Wabash "L" station, can even be seen the first Route 66 road signs! Upon recognizing the significance of everything around me, I took the photos in preparation for this article, thinking to myself all the while: "Surely there must be a stamp commemorating Route 66."

When I got home I got to work looking through my collection and any and all accompanying catalogues to find such a stamp. But alas, to both my



As I once conversed with a dealer at a TSDA show, he mentioned in passing: "Anything worth remembering has been depicted on a stamp." Using that logic it would seem as if USPS has not deemed Route 66 to be worth remembering. I find that to be tragic. For a highway that has had such an impact on the American psyche, it feels almost insulting.

Route 66 runs through Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California. Historically, several big cities, including Chicago, St. Louis, Tulsa, Oklahoma City, Amarillo, Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Flagstaff and Los Angeles lie along the route, many of them owing their development and growth to the highway itself! So impactful has Route 66 been, that it has even been nicknamed the Main Street of America. Yet even with all this, is it not worthy of being on a stamp?


There is so much history tied up in Route 66, that it is a shame it has never received a philatelic recognition (again, if I am wrong about this, somebody please correct me). It has, however, been commemorated numerous times elsewhere in movies, TV shows, and quite famously in music with the song "Get Your Kicks on Route



66" (the title of that song partly inspiring the title of this article). Yet even with all of this other recognition it still

lacks a stamp of its own.

Perhaps that will change soon. April 30, 2026 will mark the roadway's 100th anniversary and I can only hope the USPS will seize the opportunity. I would make the suggestion myself, but the Citizen's Stamp Advi-Committee sory (CSAC) requires that all ideas for stamp subjects be proposed at least three years in ad-



date. As we are now long past that suggestion deadline, I can only hope that another person equally upset at the lack of a Route 66 stamp made his suggestion known to CSAC already.

One way or another, it would seem as if Route 66's possible depiction on a postage stamp is at the mercy of USPS. I can only hope that next vear the decision makers will do the right thing and give Route 66 the recognition it deserves.

The business card in the lower left corner of the picture frame is Arnold's business card as governor of California.

Years ago, he had a poster on the wall that reads exactly what you see below right. Why?: ... 'cause apparently, some people are con-

fused by Austria vs. Australia (as is Switzerland vs. Sweden; you know: "oh, you're from Switzerland, so are Swedish!", sigh...). I used this as inspiration to have this made into US "personalized postage" via the Zazzle company in 2015 (sadly the personalized program was shuttered by the USPS in June 2020). I'll get a copy of one of these stamps to Jörg.

I did pick up an AMG souvenir cover that will be added to my collection. Much thanks to Skip Ely for handling the auction and doing all the work of sorting and listing lots and getting volunteers to help. This club is great when people help out like these guys.

April 4th and 5th brought a TSDA Bourse to the Holiday Inn in McKinney, their first time at this location. It looked pretty successful to me, although I haven't gotten the final tally on attendees. 

Skonk Works

"Skonk Works" was adopted by Lockheed back in the late 1930's for their division that was doing various classified research & development for military aircraft. The name was taken from the "Skonk Oil" factory that was featured in the "Li'l Abner" comic strip from that era that had to do with some products made of various smelly items (such



a s o I d shoes...)and because the newly formed secretive division was near areas that had various smells.

T h e creators of the comic strip requested they

change the name, so it became "Skunk Works® and is now a registered trademark of Lockheed Martin Corporation.



The first project was the Lockheed P-38 Lightning fighter plane. The 2nd project was the P-80 Shooting Star, shown here on USA Scott #3921 from 2005.

There are / were many other planes (many of which were experimental). The "U2" (see photo of

PowerPoint slide at right) and the "SR-71 Blackbird" are two of the more famous examples. These two planes are definitely featured on stamps, but not by the USA. Searching for them, they are on a series of stamps issued by the Marshall Islands in 2004. Unfortunately I do not have those stamps, but the two stamps above I did find in my US collection.

On Saturday, April 5, the University of Texas at Dallas (UTD, actually location in Richardson...), sponsored a lecture which was held at the Frontiers of Flight Museum located on Lemon Avenue (on the northeast side of Dallas Love Field Airport). The lecture was given by Kevin Renshaw, retired, a 41 year employee of Lockheed Martin Aeronautics.

Kevin did talk about a lot of interesting things, but did mention



that there is much that he can not talk about though, and that he had to sign a lot of NDA's (non-disclosure agreements) when he retired about 7 years ago. During Q&A, someone did ask about something to which he responded that he'd rather not have guys in black suits show up...

While the Skunk Works® division originated in Burbank, California, it is now at Air Force Plant 42 (in Palmdale, California); the Lockheed Martin company has its headquarters at Air Force Plant #4 in Ft. Worth and additional facilities in Marietta, Georgia.



The lecture was done using a PowerPoint presentation. Kevin is probably not a stamp collector, but from my perspective, I think it would have been neat to have some relevant stamps displayed in the slides.

Amongst attendees were many Veterans of various US Armed Forces divisions. A reception was held afterwards. They let you wander around the museum (admission to the lecture was free with prior registration). I will have to go back and spend some more time there, as the museum was expanded in the early 2000's. I think I was there one time in the late 1990's. There is also a JN-4 "Jenny" on display, as well as the Apollo 7 capsule.

There is also a nice display about Braniff Airlines, which had opened a maintenance facility at Love Field Airport in 1958. Braniff ceased operations in May 1982. While I have never flown on Braniff, my parents did many years ago (either late 1960's or mid-1970's) when they flew to Mexico. I still have a Braniff playing card deck somewhere that they gave me that has different Spanish/English words or sentences on each card.

But I digress. Great as this lecture was, in my opinion, any lecture or talk could always benefit and be enhanced by some philatelic "add-ons" though! In any case, I certainly learned some new things that afternoon!

Reports:


- General Chair Ralph Poore confirmed the hotel for the EXPO:



Jonathan Topper of Topper Stamps (Houston, TX), donated 1½ boxes of albums and some loose stamps (in stock pages). The loose stamps & stock pages will go to beginning collectors. The albums (dated 1940's to about 1968) were sparsely populated with very common stamps; the stamps will go to beginning collectors. The pages in the worldwide albums are in ok shape (although apparently had lots of stamps removed

beforehand), but are arranged in multi-year periods (so most countries repeat in each of the 5 binders shown, not how most collectors collect worldwide stamps, and aren't very useful as such). Most stamps (unless completely stuck down) were removed (and also go to beginners), and the empty pages will be re-donated to *Pegasus Creative Reuse*, where they'll end up being re-purposed by artists & scrap-bookers. The black & white stamp images on those pages will thus live on as "art" and hopefully keep the concept of postage stamps in front of others in the future. The stock pages and some other items not shown will go to Skip and will most likely be used at the EXPO Beginning Collector table.



hours of flipping thru the the 5 old albums, the result was less than 1 handful of common USA commemoratives and perhaps 2 handfuls of various foreign (many of which still had envelope remnants on the back, i.e.: they were torn off envelopes, not soaked, by the previous owner). Titanic

USA Scott #31911 was one of the stamps issued in 2000 as part of the CTC (Celebrate the Century) series of stamps.

It doesn't really "commemorate" the ship or its sinking, but rather the movie "Titanic". That said, it is the only USA stamp that features the ship. Many other countries have paid tribute to the sinking of the Titanic.

While neither I nor anyone in our family has anything to do with the Titanic itself (and actually, no, I have NOT yet seen the movie!), I took our family to the "Titanic Exhibition" that is being held in Dallas from April 2 to May 11. The exhibition is mostly about the actual ship and the events (but the movie is mentioned near the end).

It was definitely worth seeing! The self-guided tour took a bit over an hour. There were quite a few artifacts present and other period pieces, as well as several re-creations (such as the iconic staircase (#2) and a hallway (not shown).

The HMS Titanic (which was designated a "mail ship") also had a sister ship, practically identical, called the HMS Olympic. I asked an employee about "actual artifacts" from the ship, and he said that there are only about 2 of them. Since the ship is considered a "crime scene", it is not possible to privately own any items except coal from the ship! Since the Olympic was identical, many of the items that are on display are from that ship.

While the Titanic was a mail ship, they don't really say much about the postal aspects of the ship. I don't think that any mail was "rescued". There are however some postcards (#1) of the ships and even a revenue stamped Titanic Relief check from Great Britain.

When I was in the gift shop (didn't buy anything...), I remarked to an employee that given that there are quite a few stamps issued featuring the Titanic, why not get some of those for resale to visitors?

All attendees were given a "ticket" for one of the passengers on the Titanic. At the end, you got to see whether your passenger made it or not. Mine was an American playboy millionaire who was returning to New York with his mistress. He put her and the maid in the lifeboat. He (nor his valet) did not survive. His name was Benjamin Guggenheim.

The Titanic sank after striking an iceberg on her maiden voyage on April 15, 1912 (after having left England on April 10).

Of the 2,240 passengers & crew, only about 700 survived.

There is one postcard mailed from a ship employee that was shown. It was mailed by a Turkish bath attendant to his mother,

on April 5 and postmarked in Southampton during the first part of the journey from Ireland to Southampton, before it left for New York.
