Greek Owl Coin By Peter Elias

A couple of days ago I received a request for some of the free stamps that I mail out and for which I request return postage. Since the request came from Greece, they had enclosed the €1 (Euro) Coin that you see to the left in actual size and enlarged below.



Euro coins are minted for the various countries that are a part of the European Union, and while they don't state the country name on the coins, there is usually a hint as to



shows the famous "Owl" coin that has also been used on coinage from Athens back in 449 BC, and is depicted on Scott #640 above (which also shows "Athena" on the other side) and was issued in 1959 as part of a series of stamps that feature ancient Greek coins.



Now you might think that this concludes the "Been There - Done That" article, but as they say, "but wait, there's more".

I actually do own one of the "Athena & Owl' coins from 449 BC, and it is shown to the left in approximately the original size (it is only a bit more than 1/2" in diameter, so an enlarged version is shown below). Granted, my coin is a bit more worn than the one depicted on the stamp,

but nevertheless, it is the same design!



According to the "Ancient Coin Collecting, Volume 1" book by Wayne G. Sayles (which I have in my numismatic literature reference collection), there are actually 4 different versions of this coin (all are silver):

1. Tetradrachm (17.2 grams) 2. Drachm (4.3 grams) 3.Obol (0.72 grams) 4. Hemiobol (0.36 grams) The above 4 types are all

different denominations, and my coin weights around 4 grams, and is of the Drachm denomination. My guess is that the coin depicted on Scott #640 is most likely the larger Tetradrachm coin.

Despite the rather worn condition of my particular coin, I still like it and it's a neat coin to own. And this particular "Been There - Done That" article does show that the coin & stamp hobbies do occasionally converge (although I'm still more of a philatelist than a numismatist ... but I do practice some deltiology & cartography as well ...!



Been There, Done That

Teddy Roosevelt By Pat & Bob Weidman



One day while walking around Old San Juan (Puerto Rico), I came across life-size statues of nine of the U.S. Presidents. On the right in the picture shown nearby is Teddy (Theodore) Roosevelt. On the left is Woodrow Wilson. In addition, there were statues of Franklin Roosevelt, Harry Truman, Dwight Eisenhower, John F. Kennedy, Lyndon Johnson, Gerald Ford and Barack Obama. Why were there only statues of nine presidents? What about the others? These nine were men who had visited Puerto Rico!

Teddy Roosevelt visited in November 1906 while he was in office. If you remember your history, Teddy Roosevelt was indirectly responsible for Puerto Rico becoming a territory of the United States. On July 1, 1898, during the Spanish-American War, Lt. Colonel Teddy Roosevelt led the charge of the "Rough Riders" up San Juan Hill.

When Spain surrendered Cuba, Puerto Rico, Guam and the Philippines, they were turned to the United States. Cuba became a U.S. trust territory and achieved independence as a republic in 1902. The Philippines became independent on November 15, 1935, subject a transition period which ended July 4, 1946. Guam and Puerto Rico remain U.S. possessions to this day.

While doing my research for this article, I discovered that the San Juan Hill which the Rough Riders charged up is not in Puerto Rico. It is in Santiago de Cuba on the southern coast of Cuba!

USA Scott #973 was issued on October 27, 1948 for the 50th anniversary of the Rough Riders; USA Scott #1039 picturing Teddy Roosevelt was part of a definitive set issued from 1954-1968.



Greater Houston Stamp Show 2021

The Greater Houston Stamp Show was held again in the Humble, Texas Civic Center. Karen and I, along with Stanley and Judy Christmas, were the MCSC members who drove the 250 miles down there to see the exhibits, shop at the dealers, dine out with the members and enjoy a three-day show over a surprisingly beautiful summer weekend. The Houston Hurricane did not affect the show in the slightest and there were no visible signs seen showing that anything out of the ordinary had just occurred four days earlier.

The GHSS people who ran the show did their usual great job of making it a fun and amiable getaway. Tom Cunningham brought a great bunch of dealers together under one roof and they appeared to do pretty well on Friday and Saturday. But the crowds weren't there on Sunday, so there was a lot less competition for seats at the dealer's tables.

The club set up restaurant dinners for anyone who wished to go out and eat on both Thursday and Friday evenings. Their Awards Banquet was held on Saturday evening. As usual, Jay Stotts pulled out all the stops with his hilarious self-made program of on-screen questions to be answered by individuals in the audience In his entertainment production, each attendee receives a playing card at random. Then during the slide show a question is asked and a playing card from another deck is called. The person with the corresponding card is asked a question as a slide is shown.

The slide may be stamp related or can be a question such as: *"Texas Traffic congestion can be as congested as anywhere else in the world"*. True or False?" The person with the same card as was called out had to answer. The answer was "True" and another slide showed two autos in what appeared to be the Texas Longhorn cattle drive in Ft. Worth, with the cars unable to move due to being hemmed in on all sides by cattle and cattle drivers. If the person answering was a Texan and the answer was correct, he or she would be awarded a \$5 bill. If a non-Texan, the prize was \$10. \$100 in all was distributed in this manner.

Exhibit awards were then passed out Ray Cartier was awarded a Gold ribbon and medal for his 6-frame exhibit, "*Warbirds of Air Force Plant #4: Ft. Worth, TX*". He also won the TSDA sponsored "Most Popular Exhibit" prize of \$50. His two other exhibits each received a Vermeil.

Karen Cartier received a Silver-Bronze ribbon and medal, along with the ATA First Prize medal for her 2frame, "*Disney's Greatest Full-Length Animated Movies.* 1937-1998", exhibit.

Stanley Christmas received a Silver medal for his single frame exhibit, "*Christmas Island - Indian Ocean Postal Stationery*", and a Gold award for his 8 frame "*The Life Cycle of the* $4\frac{1}{2}\phi$ *White House Stamp*" exhibit.

There had also been a special competition for Brown Themed Single Frame exhibits. Of the seven exhibits in this category Ray Cartier's exhibit, "Wernher von

Braun: Villain or Hero?" won a small glass sloth for having the most unusual spin in his title. He named the image "Slo-Mo".

The FIRST Transatlantic Flight!

The first non-stop transatlantic flight was NOT Lindbergh in 1927! On June 14, 1919, two British aviators (John Alcock and Arthur Brown,

both knighted later) took off from St. John's in Newfoundland (Canada) in a Vickers biplane and landed the next day in a bog near Clifden, Co. Galway (Ireland). They averaged 118 MPH over the 1,890 mile flight.

The incentive for this flight was impressive: The London Daily Mail had offered a £10,000 prize for the first to cross! Before he could spend his £'s, poor Alcock died in a plane crash while delivering a Vickers-made plane in France.

During my 14 years living/working in Galway, I used to take the odd tourists out to the landing site, which has a granite marker at the site, still in a bog!

The 1 Euro (\in) ATM stamp above commemorates the 100th anniversary of this famous flight. We 'complain' about recent hike in 1st class postage. First class mail within Ireland is now \in 1.30 (=\$1.52), but does get you next day delivery!

On our vacation to Puerto Rico this past summer, we stayed at the Sheraton Old San Juan. It is located on the waterfront of San Juan Bay.

One day on one of my excursions around Old San Juan, I took a walk over to the US Coast Guard station. It is located by the arrow on the photo. The guard at the main gate informed me that pictures were not permitted because of security concerns. I took this picture from the top floor of the hotel where the pool is located.

The Coast Guard has been in existence since 1790. Its purpose is to enforce federal laws and treaties of the high seas and navigable waters of the United States, including crimi-



nal laws, inspection laws, pollution laws, revenue and navigation laws and nautical rules of the road. It is now attached to the Department of Homeland Security.

The stamp shown is USA Scott #936, issued on November 10, 1945. On September 25, 1493, Christopher Columbus set sail from Spain on his second voyage to what he thought were the East Indies of Asia. On board the seventeen ships that sailed with him were upwards of 1,500 colonists and private investors. On his first voyage a year earlier, Columbus landed in the West Indies that were unknown to the European explorers at that time.

On this trip, he landed in Puerto Rico, "rich port" in Spanish, which lies 1,000 miles southeast of Florida. He name the area "San Juan Bautista" ("St. John the Baptist" in Spanish).

The picture above, with the statue of Columbus, is in the Plaza del Colon in Old San Juan. It is located up the hill be-



hind the hotel that we were staying at on our trip to Puerto Rico this past summer.

The stamp is USA Scott #2805, issued on November 19, 1993 to commemorate the 500th anniversary of Columbus' landing in Puerto Rico.

Been There, Done That

Card Carrying TCS Member

In 2021, Switzerland issued a 100 centime (1 Swiss Franc) stamp commemorating 125 years of TCS.

What is "**TCS**" you are wondering at this point?

It is the "<u>T</u>ouring <u>C</u>lub <u>S</u>chweiz". Basically it is the Swiss version of the USA "AAA" (<u>A</u>merican <u>A</u>utomobile <u>A</u>ssociation"; in Germany for example, they have the "ADAC" (<u>A</u>llgemeiner <u>D</u>eutscher <u>A</u>utomobil <u>C</u>lub) and I imagine most major countries in the world have similar organizations.

So what does TCS have to do with me? Well, in 1986, I was a "card carrying" member! That was the year where I spent about 10 months working on assignment in



Switzerland. lt wasn't exactly affordable renting a car for 10 months, SO bought one, a 1979 Ford Taunus 1.6L, as shown on the picture to the left and below.

Here in the USA, I have been a member of AAA since 1978 (making me presently a 44-year member!).

However, my AAA membership wouldn't do me much good in Switzerland, so for that time in 1986, I became a member of the TCS.

Normally as a member of the TCS (as with AAA), one gets a window or bumper sticker. TCS did give me a sticker, and I put

it on the back bumper of my Ford Taunus (see blue arrow). The only picture I have of that, is the one above, where my car is parked near where I used to live as a child in the late 1960's (the sticker is just to the right of the license, shown with the blue arrow). If you don't know what a 1979 Ford Taunus looks like, I did also commemorate that car on a PhotoStamp back in 2004 or so (see above).

Back in 1986, the TCS logo had the letters T, C, S in a circle that was divided to look like the spokes of a car steering wheel (see picture on right).



In mid-December 1986, as I was preparing to return back to the USA (and my new home in Kentucky), I did of course have to cancel my TCS membership.

I remembered that growing up in Switzerland in the 1960's, that cars always had TCS metal badges on the front grille of cars (not stickers like now). I told the TCS rep that I would be returning to the USA and wondered if they still had any of the old style TCS badges, as it would be cool to have one those adorn my future cars here in the USA (as a souve-

The badge as shown above has a Swiss flag emblem at the top, which is painted red & white over the chrome. Unfortunately that does wear off once in a while, so I have to repaint it every couple of years.





Since I also have a second, slightly newer Audi (ok, it's only 18 model years old..), I was gifted another TCS medal; this one however, is NOT chromed, but more of an antique brass color. A close-up is shown to the left.

And there you have it! Another way I was able to illustrate a part of my life story via philately!

Pocket Knife

In 2008, Switzerland issued this stamp, Scott #1324 (sorry about the "moiré" pattern shown on the scan, it's how my scanner made it look, despite the background being a single light gray color).

There are two primary manufacturers of "Swiss Army Knives", the main one being the "Victorinox" company, which the knife on the left is from (and generally resides in my pants pocket...); the other company is "Wenger", which was bought by Victorinox in 2005.

Both companies have made some humongous knives featuring up to 141 different functions. Mine as you can see, is a bit more simple. The features I use most often are the 2 knives, the scissors and the 2 screwdrivers. Once in a great while, the toothpick, and oh yeah, the corkscrew!

As a kid growing up in Switzerland, I think all of boys had pocket knives, and even had them with us at school, apparently that was NOT a problem back in the 1960's. And up until "9/11", I usually also carried this on the plane with me; now of course, it has to go into my checked luggage...



Swiss Traffic Signs

Switzerland, like most countries, has a lot of traffic signs. Two of the eight pages from an older (1960's/70's) Swiss pamphlet on traffic signs are shown



above. Take note of the two common traffic signs highlighted with the blue arrow. These two signs are also



shown on the Greek & German stamps below. Unfortunately, Switzerland only had one stamp with a traffic sign, and that was from 1956

and features a "Children Crossing" sign, which isn't relevant to this article.

European traffic signs, which we have not really adopted that many of in this country (except perhaps the "no right turn" and "no u-turn" ones above), generally feature a red border. Most signs come in 3 basic shapes: a circle, a triangle with the point facing up and a triangle facing with the point down. I was told that the triangle with the point up is sort of like an A (minus the two legs) and symbolizes "Achtung" (meaning "attention"), and triangle point down is like a "V" symbolizing "Vorsicht" (meaning "caution"). The circle signs are designated as "Vorschriftsignal" (meaning "regulation signal").

So, how have I "been there - done that" in regards to European traffic signs? Having lived there as a child, I did of course have to know the meaning of at least a couple of these signs even as a pedestrian, but when I went back there in 1986 as an adult and having to drive there, I definitely needed to know all of these! ... Not that US drivers license and driving skills really prepare you for the ones you see above, not to mention a myriad of others...

A fun one is the red circle with either a red "\" or a red "X" in it. The one with the "X" means "no stopping" (nor standing, nor parking), while the "\" means "no parking", and you do see lots of those signs over there...

Going through the 1,300 or so photos that I took in Switzerland in 1986, I found the one that you see in the 2nd column at the top. It shows the town sign of



"Bitsch" (yes, I couldn't resist taking that photo...), and underneath is the speed limit sign of 60 km/h (approx. 38 mph) and the "no passing" sign (also evident by the sold white line painted on the road). Below that is a "double arrow" sign indicating that this is repeated (while the "arrow up" would mean "starting from here on", while "arrow down" would mean "ending").



Now, where exactly is this town of "Bitsch" (village actually)? It is located in the S w i s s C a n t o n o f "Valais" (known as "Wallis" in German, and hence the "VS" abbreviation below the town name) that is in southern Swit-

zerland, about 30 miles northeast of the Matterhorn.

Bitsch is fairly small, with a square area of only 1.6 sq. miles and 1,035 inhabitants as per <u>Wikipedia</u>. Probably the kind of place where "you blink - you've missed it"... More info, including "Living in Bitsch" (*Leben in Bitsch* in German) is available at community website at <u>https://www.bitsch.ch/leben-in-bitsch/lage</u> (it is in German, so you may want to use a website translator add-in). In any case, viewing the photo above from my trip 35 years ago has allowed me to research this a bit more and tie it in philatelically! Hope you all found this educational!

TV Philately: F9 - The Fast Saga

"F9 - The Fast Saga" was released in 2021 and is the 9th installment in the "Fast & Furious" film franchise, starring Vin Diesel, Michelle Rodriguez and others. The original "Fast & Furious" movie started as a street car race film back in 2021 and has since moved past that. This movie takes place in Thailand, Tiblisi (Georgia) and Edinburgh (Scotland). It's a neat movie if you like incredible car stunts and can suspend your belief a bit...

As with all movies that I watch at home, if there's a philatelic item shown, after I'm done watching the movie, I'll go back and find the spot with philatelic item and freeze-frame it

(which is easier said that done sometimes).

In this case, at around 40 minutes and 42 seconds, a postcard is shown. On the picture side appears to be a city scene of houses in Mexico (part of a plot point) and on the reverse side, a simple address and a Japanese stamp & Tokyo postmark. So, what do we have here:

- The Japan stamp. Flipping through my Scott catalog, I found the bird design stamps as #888A, issued in 1966. While the stamp design appears ok, the perforations don't quite look right, almost as if they were trimmed or even roulette. So is it real or not?
- 2) The Tokyo postmark looks similar to actual postmarks used in Japan, however, the ones I've seen (such as below) all seem to have the parallel line section in the middle further apart than the one on the stamp.
- 3) The postmark date is indistinct, and all I can make out is a 12 at the end (which would mean Noon) and what looks like an 8 right before it, so that would mean the postmark was applied between 8 to 12 (8 AM to Noon); the sample below was from 14 to 16 (2 to 4 PM).
- 4) The address shows 1327 Adelaida Rd; the City & State are not shown, but what appears to be Zip Code 90026, which is a Los Angeles zip code. There's no Adelaida Rd in Los Angeles, but that exact address does exist in Paso Robles, CA, which is Zip Code 93446

though, about 160 miles north of LA. So did they get it right? Well, it looks passable for the second or so that it is on the screen.

Message Monsters Deck Card

As a fun sideline collection, I collect "Deck Cards". These are the manila cardstock items that are on top of each pad (or "deck") of USPS stamp sheetlets or booklet panes as delivered to the Post Office. Their reason is for "accounting purposes" as the stamp pads (generally between 1,000 to 2,000 stamps) are shrink wrapped and since stamps are "accountable paper", clerks are supposed to carefully slit open the diagonal corner, bend the deck card forward and count the number of panes present, while effectively keeping the pad sealed.

Now that the USPS is NOT automatically shipping full decks to the post offices, some stamps don't even make it to the post office, or the clerk may only order a handful of sheets, making it difficult to get deck cards going forward. Here's the deck card for the recently issued "Message Monsters" stamps, which I personally find unnecessary.
