

Shown here is Scott #3590 from 2013 issued by the Czech Republic honoring the 100th birth anniversary of Otto Wichterle. He was a chemist and is best known as the inventor of soft contact lenses.

He started researching and experimenting with soft contact lenses in the late 1950's and finally succeeded in 1961 with a homemade machine that was in part a children's building kit.

The "idea" of a contact lens was first credited to Leonardo da Vinci, but it wasn't really practical to implement this idea in 1508... Before there were "soft" contact lenses, there were "hard" contact lenses made of blown glass, which were first developed in 1888 by Adolf Eugen Fick. Over the years, glass lenses evolved into plastic lenses.

<-- Remember LBJ? He was the 1st President in the history of the USA to publicly wear contact lenses (in 1964)!

There's more to read up about Otto Wichterle and contact lenses, more than I can go into here, but feel free to browse the Wikipedia entries at:

So how does all of this intersect with me? Well, in 1977 when started to drive, it was found that I had "myopia" (short-sightedness), somewhere around 20/80 to 20/100 from what I remember, and I needed to wear glasses if I wanted to drive (although, I had been delivering newspapers on my bicycle for several years prior to that). So I got glasses, you know, the "big" kind that many of us wore back in the 1970's & 1980's. The picture here (from around 1980; please no com-

ments about my fashion choices...) shows me wearing those glasses (and yes, they were made of "glass", not plastic like now) and were also "photogray" lenses (as they were called back then) that kept me from having to deal with clip-ons or a second pair of prescription sunglasses.

Luckily this all changed around 1988 or so, when I started wearing contacts while living in Kentucky. At the time, these were "daily-wear" soft contact lenses, meaning lots of handling these and constantly having to clean & disinfect them. When I moved to Dallas in 1990, I was able to switch to weekly and finally monthly-wear lenses.

In the past 10 years or so, the prescription for my contacts become a less strong every year or two. This past summer (2022), after taking off my contacts while at the yearly optometrist appointment, I looked out at the traffic in the distance (maybe 200 - 300 feet) and noticed that it was fully in focus. After testing my eyes, my vision was now 20/25 in each eye! No more contacts needed (Texas has a requirement of 20/40 or worse to require corrective vision)! So while I can thank Otto Wichterle for having invented soft contacts, I'm more grateful to the natural change back to good vision (and also not having to spend a lot of money on contacts each year!). Maybe that leaves more discretionary funds for philately?



The Cover Story (G.W. Hawley)

I went to the TSDA Stamp Show in December, always in search of interesting covers. I am a fan of digging through the dollar cover boxes that some of the dealers bring in. I was happy to see Jonathan Topper return at this show as he has been too busy to attend most of the North Texas shows this past year and he always has some interesting dollar covers. The cover above illustrates what I mean. This cover is not in the best of shape, but it got my interest because of the illustration. That guy looked familiar to me because I thought I had seen him on a Quaker Oatmeal box. So, I decided, what the heck, and threw it in my rapidly growing pile of dollar covers.

When I got home and started going through my purchases, this cover just grabbed my attention again, so I decided to do some internet searches and see what I could learn about the cover. First, I noticed the return address had been crossed out. The original return address was: The American Cereal Company, 1341 Monadnock Building, 248-286 Dearborn Street, Chicago, III. The postmark indicated the cover had been mailed from Kalamazoo, Michigan, along with the handwritten name on the left side of the envelope front which read: G.W. Hawley Kalamazoo, Mich.

It may remain a mystery to me why G.W. Hawley was in possession of this envelope, but my theory is that he may have acquired some of these envelopes as discount postage when the American Cereal Company changed it's name to the Quaker Oats Company in 1901. Coincidentally, the Quaker mascot shown on the label was the first registered trademark for a cereal brand.

G.W. Hawley was born on May 10, 1883 in Kalamazoo, Michigan, making him 25 years old when he mailed this cover. He was heavily involved in philately and it is my opinion that he was mailing stamps to a customer in West Orange, New Jersey. I have as of yet been unable to find any information on E.S. Greening. Hawley later became the editor of a magazine called the International Philatelic Quarterly which made its debut in May of 1912. He was also an ordained Methodist minister. I am of the opinion that he was a principal in a stamp company called X-T-C Stamps in Kalamazoo, however I have been unable to definitely tie him to that.

The reason for the Postage Due marking is probably due to the envelope and contents being overweight as Mr. Hawley was fond of trading stamps.

It is pretty amazing what you can piece together about a subject and some people on the internet and it makes researching a cover somewhat educational and interesting.

1 Mark

In 1998, Germany issued Scott #2007, a stamp with a face value of 1.1 DM (Deutsche Mark) to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the Deutsche Mark.

While Germany's main currency has been called the "Mark" since the original unification in 1871.

The original mark was the "Goldmark", but was taken off the gold standard after the outbreak of World War I. The currency then became known as the "Papiermark" (paper Mark) when high inflation hit in the early 1920's. The currency was then replaced with the "Rentenmark" (RM) in 1923 and with the "Reichsmark" (RM) in 1924.

After World War II, the various Allied Governments issued their own occupation currencies. The 1948 currency reform resulted in the Deutsche Mark, which was continued to be used after the unification with East Germany in 1990 (when it replaced the "Ostmark" - East German Mark, in July of that year).

With the advent of the € (Euro), it replaced the DM for non-cash transactions on January 1, 1999 and for cash transactions on March 1, 2002. The initial € to DM conversion rate was $\le 1.00 = DM 1.95583$.

The subdivision of the Deutsche Mark was the "Pfennig" (similar to "penny" in English). Coins were available in 1, 2, 5, 10 & 50 Pfennigs and DM1, DM2 & DM5 coins. Banknotes were available in DM5, DM10, DM20, DM50, DM100 & DM200 notes, along with some rarely used DM500 & DM1,000 notes. And to think it's hard for us to use any thing over \$20 banknotes here (our \$50 & \$100 banknotes are rarely used by the average person and many cashiers don't like taking them).

As a side note, I had a job working the cash register at a gas station in 1985, and we weren't allow to keep much cash around for change, and basically would have had a hard time breaking a \$100 bill.



When coming back from a European trip, I usually had some coins left over, like this DM1 coin. While you could exchange German banknotes back to Dollars, they usually would not accept coins. During a

trip to Germany in 1999 & 2000, I got rid of most of my German coins, knowing that with the change to the Euro coming, I might end up with useless money. That also meant left-over coins from the Netherlands and a few other countries, so I used them up during a quick stopover in Luxembourg (while visiting Trier).



If you go to coin shows here in the USA, you will often find older German 10 Pfennig coins such as the one to the left, they'll only cost 25¢ in typical used condition...

BCPSG + BWISC = WIPSG

The members of the US-based BCPSG (British Caribbean Philatelic Study Group) and the UK-based BWISC (British West Indies Study Circle) have voted to merge the two societies into one group, the West Indies Philatelic Study Group.

Note that the word "British" has been left out, since the new group can now also include philately from non-British entities in the West Indies (such as those of former Dutch, French and Spanish origins).

There are several reasons for this merger, one was (as is with many other philatelic organizations) due to a decline in membership, people able to run the organization and also provide quality articles for the group's journal. The BWISC & BCPSG has members in both societies, and generally speaking, the UK-based BWISC was a larger group.

I personally have been a member of both societies, albeit a bit more active with the BCPSG in the past. In 2007 I even attended one of their annual meetings, which was held on my favorite island, St. Vincent. It was a great meeting and a 2nd chance to for me to visit St. Vincent (although it did require something like 7 different flights to make the whole trip happen for my wife and myself).

Since I just renewed my BCPSG membership, it will be transitioned into a WIPSG membership. Copies of the BCPSG Journal should be available at the Wineburgh Philatelic Library. The website of the BCPSG is still up at https://www.bcpsg.com; and the BWISC site is at https://bwisc.org. I don't know yet what the site for the new WIPSG group will be called.

MCSC Euless Meeting Minutes January 18, 2023

Attendance:

 9 members participated in the January meeting at Evan Islam's new office in Euless (same location, different room).

Officer Reports:

- <u>Second Vice President</u> Stanley Christmas began the meeting at 7:30 PM. He provided a brief summary of recent developments with some of our older newsletters
- <u>Treasurer</u> Judy Christmas gave the treasury amount.

- Rick Howell talked about an FDC he didn't know he had of Scott 210 from 1883.
- Peter Elias talked about the locations from where some of the mail order items from China came from (such as Tuvalu and Azerbaijan). He also showed a cover he had mailed to Japan that was returned to him torn and dirty in a USPS "body bag envelope". He also mentioned that he had obtained a USPS deck card for the new Lunar New Year of the Rabbit issue. Finally, he showed a cover that he had received from the Lundy Island Postal Service that contained an order form if anyone was interested.
- Tom Turner showed an overprinted German Marshall Island stamp he said cataloged at a high dollar value if it was genuine. A short discussion of expertizing followed.
- Stanley Christmas talked about his ongoing research into the Adams Experimental Airmail Pick Up Service from 1939. He had discovered there were morning and afternoon flights, so he had to check the postmarks of his covers to see which was which.

Postal Validity?

In viewing the USPS.com section for buying stamps and other philatelic items, I was looking at the page for buying the Charles Schulz imperforate press sheets. First I was amazed that they were still available, given that some press sheets, especially the imperforate ones have sold out very quickly, and it has been almost 4 months since the Charles Schulz stamps were issued (September 30, 2022). The regular stamp panes seem to have sold out and the local post office doesn't carry any of them either.

There's one thing that caught my eye: the last sentence at the bottom, which reads: "the stamps on this sheet do not contain perforations for mail use". What? How are we to interpret this statement? One could read it as saying that you can not use these stamps on mail. Now I get that being as this is an imperforate sheet, that one can't easily remove a single stamp for mail use, but one could use a ruler and Xacto™ (or similar) knife and a ruler to carefully cut a straight line between the designs (but not going much beyond the stamp paper itself) so that you can peel it off for mail use; or cut all the way through so that you can create your own single pane that is not die-cut or perhaps interesting "gutter pair" varieties.

The above technique is something that I've used with various imperf sheets to use them up as postage or as part of the fees of a USPS Form 3817 (Certificate of Mailing), such as the example below, where I use a nice



Elvis gutter pair as part of the fee. No one has ever questioned me using these as postage or as Form 3817 fees (where they do make for a nice postal history item).

Perhaps the USPS should clarify what they really mean by their statement about "no perforations for mail use".



Graffiti

The Slovenian stamp to the left was released in 2020 as part of a set of 4 (which also featured a cigarette butt being tossed out of a car window, recycling and dumping trash in a woods). This one featured graffiti.

So how am I involved in graffiti? Well, I certainly don't "create" any! I did however, document graffiti in the picture shown to the right.

Back when I was at MooU (Michigan State University) in the early 1980's, I had a course in black & white photography where we also had to develop our own 35 mm film and then of course make prints.

We had various assignments in that class. At one point as I was wandering around the huge MSU campus (which is 5,000 acres / 8 square miles) and was at the sidewalk underpass of the Farm Lane bridge that goes over the Red Cedar River on campus, and on the east side of the stairway leading up to the road, was the graffiti shown in the photo. This was around 1982 or 1983. While most of my negatives & prints from those days were lost in subsequent 1986 flooding in Midland, this particular black & white print I made is one of the few that survived.

I do believe that black & white is sometimes nicer than color although that doesn't make me Ansel Adams ... At one point in the early '90's I was contemplating getting back into black & white photography, but that never materialized. Between costs of equipment and chemicals, it just didn't pan out; not to mention that 35mm film is getting difficult to find.

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The Problem With Self-Adhesive Gum

Here's what a scan of one of the "APC" vended stamps from 2012 looks like now when scanned (and basically when viewing it regularly). Notice the two lines of gray "banding" running across the stamp?

Below left is a photo of the same stamp when held up against a light source. The adhesive "leaching" through the stamp paper (and turning it translucent) is now more apparent.

In order to keep the "cutter" from getting "gummed up" after printing, they put the adhesive on in bands, and the cutter is designed to cut on the plain paper portion between the adhesive bands. The 2 black bars on the back aid in helping line up the cutting blade.

Sadly this leaching will happen to ALL stamps with self-adhesive gum over time (generally ranging from 5 to 20+ years). Some do this sooner than others; it doesn't really seem to matter how you store them. Regular US postage stamps

with self-adhesive gum (sold over the counter) will have this problem as well over time. Since the USPS doesn't really consider the above as "collectible" stamps, but "everyday workhorse stamps", they only need to last a short time and probably use a cheaper self-adhesive gum. And it's too late now to attempt to remove this horrible adhesive...

And then there's the matter of "thermal printing" (i.e.: thermal activation), which is problem #2 with most print-on-demand stamps such as these: fading! While they above seemed to have eluded fading so far, the adhesive is the worst culprit in this case. This design (plus 5 others) were actually only available as an alternate when the "small stamp" label printer had a problem!

In 2021, Bangladesh issued the stamp shown (Scott #981). While I can't read Bengali, the inscription at the bottom, "Swadhin Bangla Betar Kendra" means "Independent Bangla Radio Center" according to the

Google translator site at www.translate.google.com.

The stamp shows a typical "transistor" radio as one would find in the 1970's. And that is exactly what this stamp reminded me of: I had a somewhat similar looking transistor radio in the mid-1970's (except mine wasn't red). 

Going back further, my first "transistor" radio was a simple pocket-size battery powered AM handheld radio that my grandfather gave me back in the mid-1960's. No idea what happened to that one either... But as always, a stamp brought back some memories!
